The building was taken over by a project called "Together for Change" under the umbrella of Coventry Diocese. Jet Jones, Transformation Officer has overseen extensive renovation work so far and more is planned for the first floor and the basement.

The ground floor re opened from 9<sup>th</sup> November to provide a café area, a drop in play area, and a meeting room which can be hired.

The cafe is open between **9.30am and 2.30pm** from **Tuesday to Saturday** and provides opportunity to have light refreshments and perhaps purchase an unusual gift from the extensive display of

"Fairtrade" items and other Charity items on sale. A perfect opportunity to get Christmas gifts or buy your cards to support these Charities.


There is also a "Safe student lounge" to provide access to laptops on a Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

# CHRISTIAN CHARITY NEWS



caring for people, resourcing development run by valunteers both in the UK and overseas



Like many charities, this one started in a very small way. In 1982, Christian couple Guildford and Jean Tompkins sent one box of relief items to impoverished Ghananian students. Letters of appreciation and pleas for more help motivated Mr. Tompkins to ask other like minded people to assist him. The charity is based in Huddersfield, Yorkshire, but also has a local connection that older church members may remember from many years ago, when the then United Council of Churches of Chapel End and Hartshill was a vibrant body and our Methodist and URC church friends would collect for CART and then travel up to Yorkshire to deliver the goods from time to time.

As is usual with small charities, CART quickly grew and the small warehouse was soon too small to house the donations; so in the year 2000 a larger warehouse was purchased due to generous donations. All of CART's volunteers (over 100) are unpaid and hundreds more support the charity financially.

The charity runs a shop, where donations not suited to African needs directly are sold and the money pays for a container to take much needed goods out to various places in Africa and also to purchase items needed. Suitable donations are sent in the container, which may be clothes for orphans in Malawi, books for children's education, toys for children who have none, knitted blankets to relocated families, food parcels for families where the crops have failed due to drought or flooding, medical items to the newly opened medical aid centre in

Uganda, bicycles and wheelchairs to get people (and goods) around and the list goes on.

CART also supports sustainable projects that have a lasting impact. Some of these are funding educational sponsorship programmes in Kenya, Cameroon and Malawi, warm cots for premature babies in Tanzania, fruit tree planting and maize and bean planting, borehole digging and borehole repairs; micro-financing project in Ghana, orphan care centre in Malawi and vocational training with equipment, for a few examples.

It has come a long way from that first box of relief items sent in 1982. Amazing, how one couple's compassion and action in sending that first box has grown into what it is today, but we have seen this happen so many times haven't we? One or two people taking that first small step. Maybe God has put something on our heart and is waiting for us to take that first small step.

#### Sharon's Recipe for December - Paprika Turkey - Serves 4

#### **Ingredients**

1 large onion, chopped 1 green pepper, seeded and chopped 25g butter 10ml oil 15ml flour 22.5ml paprika 15ml tomato puree 5ml sugar 300ml vegetable or chicken stock Salt and freshly ground pepper 350g cooked turkey, cut into bite-sized pieces 150g natural yogurt 225g of dried noodles to serve



#### Method

- 1. Fry the onion and pepper in the butter and oil until pale gold and soft
- 2. Remove from the heat and stir in the flour, paprika, tomato puree and sugar
- 3. Gradually blend in stock and seasoning.
- 4. Return to the heat and cook gently until the sauce boils and thickens
- 5. In a separate pan, prepare the noodles according to packet instructions
- 6. Cover the sauce with a lid and simmer gently for 15 minutes
- 7. Add turkey to sauce and stir then add the yoghurt
- 8. Heat through for 5 minutes without boiling, just simmering to ensure turkey is thoroughly reheated and is safe to eat
- 9. Serve with the noodles.

# **Sharon's Recipe for January - Plum & Cherry Bread and Butter Pudding -** Serves 6

#### **Equipment**

20x27cm ovenproof dish, lightly buttered

#### **Ingredients**

8 slices (approx. 250g brioche)
3 plums, stones removed, sliced
2 nectarines, stones removed,
sliced
50g raspberries
15g pistachios, chopped
120g cherry jam
600 ml full fat milk
2 eggs, lightly beaten
30g caster sugar
2tsp vanilla bean paste or essence
Icing sugar to serve



#### Method

- Heat the oven to 180 degrees C / Gas 4. Spread the sliced brioche with the jam, tear it up and place in the dish. Arrange all the fruit and nuts on top.
- Mix the milk, eggs, caster sugar and vanilla paste/essence together and pour over the brioche and fruit
- Bake for 30 minutes
- Cool for 5 minutes then sift a little icing sugar over before serving.
