We do hope you will want to join in making your own Christingle and you will be helping to support the work of the Church of England's Children's Society.

Church Services

The Government announced this week that restrictions on public worship are to be lifted after the current lockdown expires on 2nd December.

Although we are currently awaiting further advice from the Church of England, we are anticipating that church services **will be able to take place** at Holy Trinity and St Peters next Sunday December 6th at our normal times.

Arrangements will be as before. To be Covid 19 safe we will still be restricted on numbers that can be accommodated within each church building. So, if you would like to attend a church service please either phone or e mail Heather. It may not always be possible to fit everyone in on a particular Sunday especially during the Christmas period.

So please do not just turn up unless you have received confirmation from either Heather or Sharon that you are able to come. This is so important as we do not want to turn anyone away. Heather will devise a rota system if necessary.

A reminder that face masks (face shields are not a suitable substitution) must be worn while in Church (the only exemption being the service leaders and preachers who can remove them temporarily to talk).

In line with Government restrictions for Tier 3, which we are in, those attending will not be able to interact with anyone outside a household or support bubble. Please do respect this while on Church premises.

We will continue to email out our virtual services. If you know anyone who would like to receive our services by email, then please let Heather or Sharon know.

The Churches' Premises outside services are closed to everyone and entry can only take place with the agreement of Heather or in her absence the Churchwardens – please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

We would ask for your prayers during what is going to be a difficult situation for our Churches and also, we would love to hear of anyone who needs prayer during these difficult and worrying times.

Christian Union are mission teams operating at the heart of university and college campuses. They are led by students, resourced by CU staff workers and supported by local churches. Their aim is to reach students for Christ.

In 1919 Norman Grubb, a young student at Cambridge University had one overwhelming urge - to get around to all the rooms of the men in his college and witness to them about Christ. He did this with some urgency and a lot of commitment, and a number of students came to know the Lord Jesus. He had a vision that every university and college in Britain and around the world should have its evangelical and witnessing Christian Union. From small beginnings (as is so often the case) this spread into the world-wide Christian Union Fellowship.

Much has changed since those early days but CU - the students, staff and supporters still live to speak for Jesus whilst at university. Student life today sees many students affected by debt, loneliness and pressure and sadly, increasingly few students nowadays come from church backgrounds or have any biblical knowledge or Christian faith. The CU exists to give every student on campus an opportunity to hear about Jesus. Over one million gospels have been given by students, to other students and hundreds of students are coming to faith each year through the work of Christian Union. Good news indeed.

CU members are non-denominational and they welcome students from different backgrounds, denominations and church traditions. They organize special events and mission weeks including evangelistic lunchbars.

The organization can provide New Student Welcome packs to help students adapt, settle in and make friends, and for those students who are already

Christians before going off to university they can help them find a local church and a new Christian family whilst they are far from home.

They also run Impact Groups where like-minded students can come together to study the Bible and have meaningful discussions in small groups.

New students who started university this autumn and find themselves isolated in lockdown must be finding great comfort through Christian Union groups.

Sharon's Recipe - Chocolate and Orange Christmas Pudding with White Chocolate Orange Sauce (Serves 8)



Pudding Ingredients

125g butter, at room temperature and softened
175g dark brown sugar
2 large eggs, beaten
4 tbsp creme fraiche
zest of 2 oranges
Keep the zested 2 oranges
2 tsp essence of orange
125g plain flour
50g cocoa
2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
1-2 tbsp milk (of required)
25g desiccated coconut

Method Pudding

- 1. Butter and base line a 1 litre pudding basin.
- 2. Cut out a rectangle of baking parchment and create a pleat along its length and keep to one side
- 3. Cut out a rectangle of foil and fold a crease in that two. Set to one side with the string.
- 4. Sieve the flour, cocoa, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda together and set aside
- 5. Place the butter and sugar in a large mixing bowl and cream together with an electric whisk until pale and creamy.
- 6. Add the crème fraise and whisk in.
- 7. Gradually whisk in the eggs making sure it is well mixed with each addition. If the mixture starts to curdle put a dessertspoon of the flour mixture into the mix and beat in and continue to add the eggs and even more flour mixture if needed until all the egg is beaten in. Add the essence of orange and whisk in well.
- 8. Add the coconut, nuts, dried fruit, cherries and chocolate chips and gently stir in with a metal spoon.

25g chopped nuts – any such as walnuts, pecan, macadamia, walnut, almond
50g glace cherries, washed and quartered
25g chocolate chips
Greaseproof paper
Kitchen foil
1 litre pudding basis
Pan large enough to hold the pudding basin comfortable and its lid
String

White Chocolate Orange Sauce Ingredients

300g segments of Terry's White Chocolate Orange (2 Terry's Choc Oranges) 100g butter 500 ml double cream 4 tbsp demerara sugar Zest of 1 orange

- 9. Sift the flour, cocoa, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda again over the mixture and stir in with a metal spoon until completely incorporated. Add a little milk if the mixture seems a little too stiff. Set aside
- 10. Thinly slice the first of the 2
 zested oranges and use a big slice
 and put it on the bottom of the
 buttered basin, use other slices,
 biggest ones first to partially line
 the basin, finish with the smallest
 slices at the top edge of the basin.
 You will probably need to use
 some of the second orange as well.
 These will look pretty when the
 pudding is turned out as they cover
 the pudding so arrange them
 neatly.
- 11. Spoon the mixture into the basin. It will fill it to the top. Level off the top and then cover with the baking paper. Make sure it fits over the top of the sides of the basin and secure with some string then place the foil over the top and secure in place with string as well then trim off any excess paper and foil. Pop into the pan, ensuring that the water comes up two thirds up the side. Cover the pan with the lid and bring the water to the boil and then simmer for 2 hours.

Meanwhile make the Chocolate orange Sauce

- 1. Over a double broiler, (heatproof bowl over a saucepan of water) gently melt the chocolate stir it often as white chocolate can very easily granulate so by stirring often you make sure that it is evenly heated and you won't accidentally overheat it.
- 2. Meanwhile, stir the remaining ingredients together in a small saucepan and heat until evenly combined.
- 3. Remove both pots from the heat, and add the orange cream bit by bit to the melted chocolate stirring it together each time you pour some cream into the chocolate.
- **4.** Once well combined, serve immediately or, once cooled, pour into a jar and refrigerate until needed. You can serve it cold or warm it up and it will keep for around 3 days.


Most of us will not want to be steaming our pudding for 2 hours on Christmas day so it is recommended that you either make the day before or freeze the pudding because unlike traditional ones they will not keep for weeks without going stale. On Christmas morning defrost at room temperature for 2 hours. To reheat put it in the microwave on medium for 5 minutes.

Gently reheat the White Chocolate Orange Sauce in a saucepan on the hob.

Serve at the table so that everyone sees the pudding at its best when it is whole. It goes into 8 good sized portions so serve into individual bowls and pour the sauce round it. Don't pour it over as it soaks in too much.

If you don't like coconut, cherries, dried fruit, chocolate chips or nuts just substitute by taking out one item and replace with more of another. You could vary it by using dates, prunes, popping candy etc just make sure that the weight (and volume) is roughly as in the recipe so that the sponge can hold the filling – hope you enjoy!

NATIVITY PLAY


