

He invites us all on a journey with Him and only we can respond to that that call. Will you be the 'one' God calls us all to be?

anyone who would like to receive our services, then please let Heather know. Our virtual service will be posted on the Churches' Facebook pages as well.


We would love to hear of anyone who needs prayer or contact during these difficult and worrying times. We will be really pleased to arrange regular phone calls to support people at this time.

Praying for our Parish in February 2021

1	For all those working in the NHS, particularly those on covid wards, who have been and continue to be under immense pressure. And who have had to juggle work life with keeping their families safe.	
2	For those who have had operations or treatment cancelled due to the current situation particularly where they are in pain or face a life-threatening diagnosis.	
3	For those currently in hospital or in care homes since family and friends are not currently allowed to visit and who may be feeling vulnerable and alone.	
4	For family and friends who have been unable to visit a loved one in hospital or a care home but who would just like to be there, to give them a hug and reassure them they are loved.	
5	For those working in care homes who were initially vulnerable due to lack of PPE and are now awaiting vaccines to be administered.	
6	For those who have played a part in funerals ensuring dignity and respect for the bereaved whilst coping with the challenging circumstances of the last few months.	
7	The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us $-$ praise God (John 1: $1-14$).	

8	For families who are struggling to juggle working from home with educating their family, particularly where they do not have the technology required.	
9	For families who are finding that living together 24/7, perhaps in small homes with no access to gardens, is causing problems, particularly thinking of those who may be being abused.	
10	For families who are struggling to make ends meet, where jobs may have been lost and difficult choices have to be made about where money is spent.	
11	For family and friends who are no longer part of our lives but have played an important role and who we remember with gladness.	
12	For other countries in the world who do not have access to health care facilities or the finance to ensure the safety of their people.	
13	For those in national and local Government who have had to make, and continue to make, difficult decisions on our behalf. And for those in opposition who question and challenge decisions trying to ensure that the right ones are made.	
14	For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ (2 Corinthians 4 6). May your light shine in our lives.	

Sometimes life gets us down and we find it hard to see things to be thankful for. Open our eyes to see the gifts you've given us in our lives Father.

"I will give thanks to you, LORD, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds." Ps. 9:1

HYMNS

When you come to church you hear hymns. Hymns are songs of praise to God. Some are very old and some, like the ones you may sing at school, are new.

Have you ever wondered who wrote the hymns we sing? For example, one hymn writer was Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander, the wife of the Bishop of Londonderry. She wrote a book called 'Hymns for Little Children' which was dedicated to her godchildren. The book was published in 1848 and contained hymns that we know well today; 'All Things Bright and Beautiful', 'Once in Royal David's City' and 'There is a Green Hill Far Away'.

It is said that she wrote the last hymn because of the view from the Bishop's palace. The house looked out over the city walls to the green hills in the distance.

So the words we sing today come from the view that Mrs Alexander had from her window.

Christians In Sport is a UK based charity that aims to reach the world of sport for Jesus and works mainly with sportspeople in competitive and elite sports. In 1976 a handful of Christians were drawn together by their desire to live and share their faith in the world of sport. The group had met in the arena of professional tennis when Gerald Williams, the BBC tennis commentator met the Reverend Alan Godson in the early 1970's at a tennis tournament which led to his own journey of faith. Whilst working in America, Gerald later met an American sports evangelist introduced by Wimbledon champion Stan Smith.

Businessman and keen tennis fan Kenneth Frampton joined the group for the first meetings of Christian sports players and they committed themselves to pray for 5 points, one being a sports fellowship across the nation which would unite faith and sport. The sports fields and clubhouses were their mission fields. The group had a feeling that God could do something through Christians in sport if they made themselves available to Him.

In June 1976 on the eve of the world famous tennis tournament, a dinner was held in London for eighty Christian sports men and women. Attending that dinner was Brian Adams, a member of the British Race Walking team at the Montreal Olympics who would the following day be on a plane bound for altitude training camp prior to competing at the Olympic Games and he found it exciting to be sent off with the knowledge that what he was doing in sport was for God.

Forty years later, hundreds of thousands of people involved in sport have heard the gospel throughout the UK. God has unfolded His abundant Blessings through the humble prayers and actions of Christians living out

their faith in sports clubs, universities and also at elite level. The charity supports over 10,000 Christians within the sporting world and over 1,000 sports leaders have been equipped and encouraged.

Christians in Sport partners with indigenous sporting ministries across 150 countries. Although it all started with the sport of tennis, it quickly spread to include sports all across the spectrum. Prayer support is available for Christians found in all sports, whether competitors or coaches, including disability sports and for parents of up and coming young sportspeople.

Many sportspeople can be away from home and church for weeks at a time and it is good to know they can have fellowship, prayer and support with other Christians at these times.

Sharon's Recipe - Rocky Road Treats

Makes about 20 portions

Really easy so everyone can make – great for the one you love around Valentine's Day – And you can use their favourite sweets to personalise

Equipment

8 or 9 inch / 20 or 23 cm square cake tin Grease-proof paper

To give as a gift you will also need small cellophane bag(s) and some ribbon.



Ingredients

125g unsalted butter150 g Milk Chocolate150 g Dark Chocolate3 tbsp Golden Syrup

100g digestive biscuits smashed into pieces (or 70g digestive biscuits & 30g ginger biscuit is good. Or Can use malted milk or rich tea or a combination of whatever you like best) make them as fine or as lumpy as you like but make sure they are still in pieces not crumbs

100g nuts chopped, (your favourite) I like walnuts best but any eg, brazils, hazelnuts, peanuts etc

100g mini pink and white marshmallows

50g of your favourite chocolatey sweets eg Crunchy, Rolo's, Maltesters etc or dried fruits cut into small pieces

50g white chocolate (for drizzling over the top)

Method

Line the tin with grease-proof paper and overlap it so that you can make sure that you can grip it and pull the Rocky Road out of the tin once it is set

In a saucepan over a low heat melt the butter, milk and dark chocolate and the golden syrup together

When it is melted add the biscuits, nuts, marshmallows and sweets / fruit and stir well

Pour into the lined tin and smooth the top

In a heat-proof dish over a saucepan of hot water gently melt the white chocolate, stirring it often then using a teaspoon drizzle it over the top of the Rocky Road in a zig-zag pattern

Put in the refrigerator for 2 hours

Remove from the refrigerator and pull up on the grease-proof paper to remove the Rocky Road from the tin

Warm a sharp knife with water from a hot tap so that the blade is luke warm and use it to cut into equal pieces. The size is up to you. It usually makes about 20

To make a gift, put a few cakes in the cellophane bag(s) and tie with the ribbon


