Praying for our Parish in January

January, the doorway to a new year, a gift from God. Revelation 3:20 Here I am! If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me.

1st - As the new year arrives, renew your faith in Christ Jesus. Trust in His unfailing love for all and ask Him to bless your new year plans, hopes and dreams, and comfort your fears. Psalm 65:11 – You crown the year with Your goodness, and Your paths drip with abundance.

2nd - New Year's resolutions begin with a promise to ourselves to change the bad habits that have emerged over the last year. As we make promises to ourselves let's take a moment to remember Gods promise to us. 11th – Matthew 9 vs 37: ‘The harvest is plenty but the workers are few.’ Pray today for all those who work in the service of our church, from those who minister spiritually up front to those who work behind the scenes keeping the fabric of the church in good order. Ask yourself today, ‘Is there anything I can do to help?’

12th – As we grow old we need the love, care and support not only of our families but also of care homes. Pray today for the care homes in the Nuneaton area who look after the elderly in our communities, pray for the employees who work in them and pray for the elderly who live in them and call them home. Psalm 71 vs 9: Do not cast me off in old age; do not forsake me when my strength fails.

13th – Pray today for local businesses and employers and ask that they will be successful, providing essential work for local people, ensuring a fair days wage is given, and respect the work that their employees do for them for the good of their businesses. ‘*Nothing is better for man than that his soul should enjoy good in his labour*’. Ecclesiastes 2:24

14th - Pray today for the armed forces. Give thanks for the protection they provide.

15th - In the deep mid-winter, earth stands hard as iron, water like a stone! Pray today for all farmers and agricultural workers as they work in harsh conditions to tend land and live-stock.

16 – House groups meet weekly to read God’s word, pray for those in need and learn about God’s teaching through the bible. Pray today for those involved in all house groups. Pray especially for the new Alpha course, its leaders and those seeking to learn more about God.

17th – Pray today for the mission and values of Messy church. Support the leaders as they strive to bring the church to families in our community, where values are about being Christ-centred, for all ages, based on creativity, hospitality and celebration.

18 - Genesis 1 vs 1 -*Then God said, “Let the land produce vegetation: seed-bearing plants and trees on the land that bear fruit with seed in it, according to their various kinds.”* Thank God today for the wonders and beauty of Hartshill Hayes. 21st – Pray today for ‘World religion day’. Pray for understanding of other faiths and beliefs, acceptance of different religions and peace between them.

22nd - In these times of change and uncertainty about the future of our country, pray for all politicians who are making decisions on the shape and future of our great nation. Pray that the decisions they make will be wise and based on the good of the country and its citizens.

23rd – Pray today for yourself. Give thanks for the blessings in your life, say sorry for the times you have acted incorrectly or failed to act when needed, plead with God, ask Him for help with the things on your heart and trust in Him to work for your good. Psalm 33 vs 4 - For the word of the Lord is right and true; he is faithful in all He does.

24th - Pray today for our church wardens, readers and PCC members. Support and uphold them as they deal with financial and spiritual challenges in our church. Offer practical help for the care and maintenance of our wonderful buildings. Support all outreach initiatives and pray that our church swells in number and God’s word is spread throughout our local area.

25th - *To care for those who once cared for us is one of the highest honours. ‘Tia Walker’.* Help us to love and support the elderly in our community. Provide them with a friendly listening ear, company and respect. We can learn a lot from them!

26th - A prayer for those seeking work. Father, we thank you for the many gifts that you provide. Today we pray for all those looking for work. Give them patience, wisdom and opportunities. Strengthen their faith as they wait on you, providing them with a job quickly so that they may use their gifts for your name.

27th - ‘The Lord sustains him on his sickbed, in his illness you restore him to full health’. Psalm 41:3. Say a prayer for the sick today for God to touch with His healing hands, giving comfort and peace needed to get through present troubles.

28th – Today is a celebration of marriage, a God ordained institution, between David and Samantha. Genesis 2:24 : Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh.

29th – Pray today for the Deanery standing committee meeting. Matthew 18 vs 20: *For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them.*”

Serving in Mission (SIM)

This charity has a long history of men and women who journeyed to different places to share the gospel, many losing their lives in the attempt. Landing in Africa, Asia and South America at the end of the 19th century these pioneers began missions committed to reach people who had never heard of or known the love of Christ. In those days the journeys were very long and hazardous, taking many weeks of even months to cross the seas and oceans. On arrival even more dangers (or death) awaited them, with unfriendly natives and many serious diseases too.

Over a hundred years later those serving with SIM still work with the same passion and commitment and put the gospel of Jesus Christ at the centre of all they do. Their mission statement is "Convinced that no-one should live and die without hearing God's good news, we believe that He has called us to make disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ in communities where he is least known."

SIM is an evangelical, international and interdenominational mission and they have more than 4,000 mission workers serving in more than 70 countries, which now include Europe. They are a people of prayer, depending on God to provide all their needs. Prayer is foundational in their life and ministry and are committed to the urgent and unfinished task of making disciples of Jesus Christ in all nations. They have a deep understanding that following Christ's example means sacrifice, sometimes hardship and maybe even death and call upon the Holy Spirit to empower their ministries.

We used to think of missionaries as people who left our shores for far off countries to tell the nations about Jesus, but the UK is itself in great need of hearing the good news of Christ and workers come here to evangelize,

having already set up partnerships with local churches in Tower Hamlets and other areas.

The Middle East is another area where SIM workers are serving and they also work with refugees and displaced persons from many countries.

There are many openings for workers of differing skills and gifts, including education, healthcare, IT and administration to name a few.

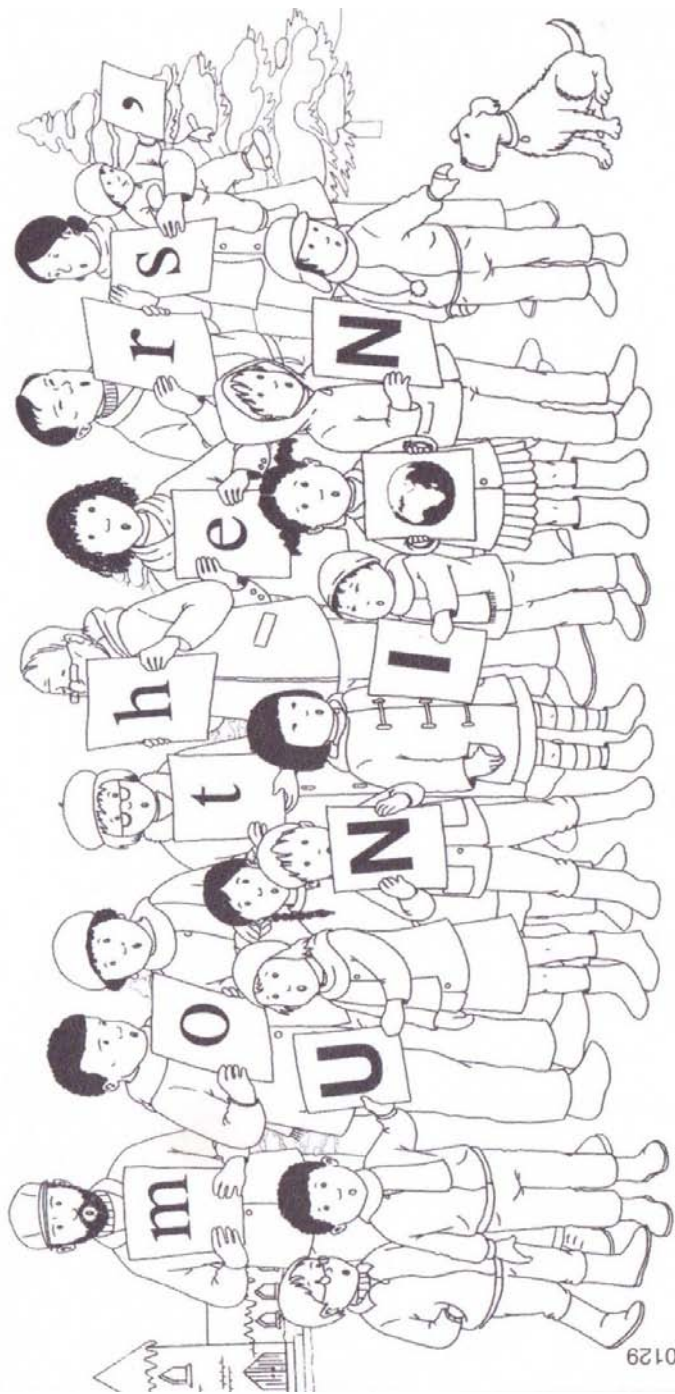

CHRISTMAS CARDS

Time to write your Christmas cards again – what designs have you picked to send this year? Are they religious ones?

Look in the shops at all the different designs, traditional and modern. Traditional religious cards have usually included the nativity – Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus. But what else would you count as religious? The Three Kings? The Bible doesn't say they were kings, or that there were three; just that they were Wise Men, who travelled far to bring special gifts for the baby Jesus.

Do you know why there are so many robins on Christmas cards? The first postmen in Victorian times wore red and were called robins, so robins were shown as delivering cards.



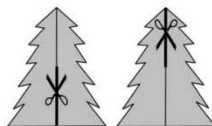
Whatever kind of card you send this year, be sure to include a kind message with love for your friends. Our love is a tiny echo of God's love for all the world.

CARD or DECORATION

Here is a simple 3-D Christmas tree that you can use as a decoration or a card. You will need green card, crayons, glitter or paint, scissors and sticky tape.

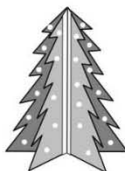
Fold a piece of card in half, then cut it in half. Put the two pieces together and fold them in half again.

Draw half a Christmas tree opposite the fold. Cut along the line and you will have 2 identical trees. Fold the trees in half, very lightly, hardly creasing the centre line to mark the centre of the tree. Cut a slit along the bottom half of the centre of one tree and along the top half of the centre



of the other tree. Slip the two trees together along the slits. To help the tree to stand firmly, use sticky tape to fasten the parts together where they meet.

Decorate the tree. If you are using it as a card then leave an area free of decorations so that you can write on it.

Sharon's Recipe - Cashew Nut Paella (V) Serves 4

Ingredients	Method
<p>Large pinch of saffron strands 750ml hot vegetable stock 2tbsp olive oil 1 leek, chopped 1 onion, chopped 2 cloves garlic, crushed 1 red pepper, deseeded and chopped 1 carrot, chopped 250g paella rice 150ml dry white wine 115g chestnut mushrooms, sliced 115g roasted, unsalted cashew nuts Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste 115g fresh shelled or frozen peas 1.5tbsp chopped thyme 4 tomatoes, quartered ½tsp smoked To Garnish: flat leaf parsley and lemon wedges To Serve: Crusty bread (optional)</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Put the saffron in the stock to infuse2. Heat the oil in a paella pan or large frying pan and fry the leek, onion, garlic, red pepper and carrot, stirring for 3 minutes until softened, but no browned3. Add rice and stir until coated in oil and glistening4. Add wine and stir whilst it boils until it has been absorbed5. Stir in the saffron-infused stock, mushrooms and nuts and season to taste6. Bring to the boil, stirring once, then reduce the heat, cover, and simmer very gently for 10 minutes7. Add the peas and thyme, stir gently, then distribute the tomatoes over the top8. Cover and simmer very gently for a further 10 minutes until the rice is just tender and has absorbed most of the liquid but is still creamy9. Sprinkle the paprika over and stir through gently, taking care not to break up the tomatoes.10. Taste and adjust the seasoning if necessary1. Garnish with parsley and lemon and serve hot, with crusty bread if desired
