

Christmas Letter

I am writing this at the beginning of November yet thoughts of Christmas are looming large. For me the period leading up to Christmas is one of mixed emotions.

Firstly, there is a feeling of anxiety and some stress- will I get everything done in time, what presents should I buy for families and friends, writing Christmas cards and so on. There is also a feeling of excitement, anticipation and happiness especially with the prospect of spending time with all my family over the Christmas period. Also receiving cards and, on the day, a lovely meal and presents.

For some people they will have different emotions over Christmas. Some people will be feeling sad because they have lost a loved one during the year and will be having Christmas without them. Some people will feel lonely because they are spending Christmas alone. Some will have worries about money and not being able to afford presents for their children.

Some of those emotions were shared by Mary and Joseph as they were awaiting the birth of Jesus over 2000 years ago. Their experiences are described in Matthew Chapter 2 and Luke Chapter 2.

They had already been told that he was going to be a very special baby- the actual son of God. So we can imagine the feeling of anticipation Mary and Joseph would have felt.

However, the Roman Caesar Augustus had ordered a census of the whole Empire and required everyone to return to their own town to register. Mary and Joseph had to go from Nazareth to Bethlehem, a distance of some 80 miles which by foot would have taken at least 4 days. It must have been very difficult as Mary was so heavily pregnant.

When they arrived in Bethlehem there were lots of people and finding accommodation was impossible. We can imagine the anxiety as the Baby

was due and the only place they could find was a stable. The rest of the Christmas story is well known and is marked by happiness and excitement.

However, after the birth Herold wanted to find Jesus to kill him - he was a threat. Mary and Joseph were instructed by an angel to escape to Egypt. It must have been a frightening time and without people with them it must have felt lonely.

So this Christmas, as we go through the different emotions we all will have, we can remember that those emotions were shared by Mary and Joseph. Yet it was rewarded with the very special birth of Jesus, the son of God. His life and his death showed us God's grace and love to each one of us. So how ever you spend Christmas this year look to Jesus, the one who can bring love, comfort and peace to our lives.

Introducing - Posada

We have some very special Advent ‘visitors’ who would like to travel around the parish (or beyond) during Advent. They would begin their journey on December 1st arriving back at church on Christmas Eve.

The tradition of Los Posados comes from Mexico, where in years gone by there would be processions at night during Advent, and two people would dress up as Mary and Joseph and go to different houses each evening. They would ask for a room for the night and tell the people about the imminent arrival of Jesus.

We are following the modernised version where nativity figures are taken from home to home (or work places, community spaces) each day during Advent.



We have a set of figures (Mary, Joseph and a donkey) which will be placed in a special box alongside candles, prayers and other resources to help make their journey special. You might want to invite friends around the night you ‘host’ them or have a special meal to celebrate their journey with you.

There is a list at the back of church to sign up to host the Posada and more information will be found inside the box and explanations given over the next few weeks at Church.

We were delighted to receive the following letter from Ruth at Aim for Change on 19th November 2018

Dear Friends at Holy Trinity Church, Hartshill

Thank you very much for your generous donation in support of the work of Aim for Change in Uganda and Pakistan.

As you may be aware from our latest newsletter, we have many youngsters in Uganda who are now reaching the end of their Secondary education and who hope to continue their studies either at university or on vocational training courses. Several have already begun their higher education and are doing very well. In Mbarara, where we support a large project for street children, there are young people who have been sponsored through Aim for Change, throughout their Primary, Secondary and Higher Education – they now have jobs and are giving a donation from their income to enable other younger street children to go to school!

In Pakistan, the children at the orphanage are doing well and growing up fast. The orphanage school is expanding and now has nearly 50 pupils and the little school in the Christian colony, where a qualified teacher educates many children in her little yard and dwelling is still going strong, giving an opportunity to children who would not otherwise be able to go to school.

We continue to provide resources, educational materials and equipment for these schools.

Your donation will help us to give children in both countries the opportunity to learn, offering them hope for a bright future.

Epiphany, or the 12th day of Christmas, falls on January 6 and marks the official end to the festive season. Traditionally, this is the day when Christmas decorations should be put away.

Epiphany also marks the visit to the baby Jesus by three Kings, or Wise Men. According to Matthew 2:11, they offered symbolic gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The gifts were symbolic of the importance of Jesus' birth, the gold representing his royal standing; frankincense his divine birth; and myrrh his mortality.

Sharon's Recipe – Love Biscuits

These are great to make with Children over the Christmas holidays

Makes about 15

Cooking time 25 Minutes

Preparation 20 mins plus 15 mins chilling (although it can take longer if you are having fun with children)

Equipment	Method
Cling film	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Dice the butter into a big bowl. Tip in the flour, sugar and a pinch of salt.2. Gently rub in the butter with your fingertips, it will resemble breadcrumbs, carry on and then bring the dough together into a ball. If it feels dry just keep going and eventually it will start to clump together and then form the ball, it does take about 5-10 minutes to form the ball.3. Wrap in cling film and chill in the fridge for 15 minutes.4. Take out of the fridge – at this point Preheat oven to gas mark 4/180 degrees C/ 350 degrees F and line baking tray(s) with greaseproof paper.5. Turn the dough on to a floured surface and roll to about ½ cm thick – its best to do this in smaller batches rather than the whole ball of dough at once.6. Cut out heart shapes with a biscuit cutter *** and lay on the greaseproof paper on the baking tray(s).7. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes – keep an eye on them and remove when they are golden brown.8. Leave to cook on a wire tray.
Baking tray (or ideally trays)	
Rolling pin	
Heart shaped cutter	
***3mm coloured ribbon cut into 30 cm lengths (optional)	
Ingredients Biscuits	
150 g butter at room temperature	
75 g caster sugar	
225 g plain flour	
Pinch of salt	
Ingredients Icing	
8-10 tbsp icing sugar	
Food colouring (optional)	
Sprinkles	

To decorate the biscuits mix together 8-10 tbsp icing sugar, a few drops of food colouring if using, and enough water to make a paste that is stiff enough to run slowly off the spoon.

Spread or drizzle the icing over the biscuits then decorate with sprinkles.

Leave to set before eating.

*****If you want to hang these from an artificial Christmas tree (for hygiene reasons do not hang on a real tree) or want to make a gift out of them. Cut a small hole into the middle of the biscuits horizontally, and a couple of cm below the top vertically using a skewer or a daisy cutter and once the icing on the biscuits is set thread the ribbon through the hole, tie a small knot in it and hang on the tree for up to 48 hours. These make a lovely gift and spread lots of joy when shared.**

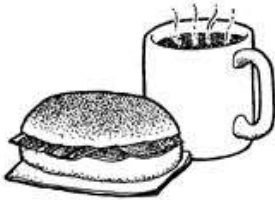
