Prayer

Prayer is described as 'a solemn request or expression of thanks addressed to God'. I never feel as though I pray enough, which makes me feel guilty then, when I do ask God for help with a particular situation or problem. I feel like I'm the friend who you only ever see when they want something. But then a lot of people say they feel they don't pray enough - so it seems many of us could do with some help when it comes to prayer.

I recently assisted Heather in hosting a 'Bishop's Certificate in Discipleship & Mission' module on prayer. The 'course' was spread over three Saturday mornings and it made me realise just how many different types of prayer exist as well as the many different ways we can pray ourselves. There are some simple guidelines that we can follow to help us pray. The first is called Teaspoon because it is based on an acronym "tsp" - **T**hank you - **S**orry - **P**lease. First we say **Thank you** God for Followed by **Sorry** for and then **Please** help Another is "ACTS" - Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Supplication (or petitioning). They are easy to remember and help to structure our conversation with God. Of course there is also the prayer that Jesus taught us in Matthew 6: 9-13 - The Lord's Prayer.

There are also many books full of prayers to help us in different situations; prayers for the sick, prayers for a friend in need, morning prayers, evening prayers etc. etc.

At Holy Trinity we will be hosting a Prayer morning on a Saturday in the near future so, if you are interested, look out for the date when it is announced.

Finally I will sign off with a Prayer I recently came upon:

God of the still small voice, teach us each day to find time for moments of quietness - time to ponder, to pray and to meditate on your gracious love. Breathe peace within our souls, so that we may see the demands and responsibilities of daily life in a fresh light, able to meet them with rekindled faith and calm assurance, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

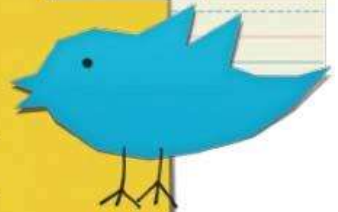

THE MISSION TO SEAFARERS

The Mission to Seafarers was founded in 1856, although its work started some 20 years earlier when Revd. John Ashley began visiting ships at anchor in the Bristol Channel and, struck by their isolation and needs, he set up a ministry to seafarers which became the Bristol Channel Mission. His work soon inspired Anglican ministries in other ports and it was decided that there should be one organization called The Missions to Seamen (it became the Mission to Seafarers in 2000).

Today, this charity works in over 200 ports worldwide and runs seafarers' centres in 121 ports, offering refreshments, television and other recreational activities, giving seafarers a chance to spend time away from the ship while docked and also offer internet and phone facilities to get in touch with families back home. Many seafarers are away from home for many months to provide for their families and live in cramped conditions, have harsh and sometimes unsafe working conditions and encounter tension and bullying between crew members and the isolation from family and friends can lead to loneliness, anxiety and depression.

The Mission to Seafarers' chaplains visit hundreds of ships a day in ports to offer help, support, advice and a listening ear to crew members' problems. Some disreputable ship owners don't pay crew members their wages for months on end and some owners even abandon ships leaving the crew on board to fend for themselves with no supplies and no way to get themselves home, often thousands of miles away. The Mission to Seafarers step in and offer caring help and repatriation and also work to uphold seafarers' rights, to ensure justice, fair pay and better working conditions at sea and also fight to recover wages which haven't been paid to the sailors.

Sometimes a crew member is injured at sea and is taken to hospital at the next port and left there while the ship continues on its journey. Imagine being all alone in a foreign country and probably not being able to speak the language of that country you've been left in. The chaplains visit the sailor while in hospital and try to inform the family and relocate him after recovery.

There are around one and a half million seafarers, many of whom come from very poor countries who work away from home to provide for their families. Piracy is a terrifying reality for many seafarers as they sail in the area of Somalia and many ask the chaplains for prayers for their safety. There are hundreds currently being held hostage by pirates and endure torture in dehumanising and brutal conditions. These are the ever present risks taken by seafarers as they bring our food and household goods to us.

Have a look around your home and guess how many things have arrived by sea. What would you say? 30%, 50%, maybe 70%. The answer is over 90%! Even if you found something made in England, a lot of the raw materials are foreign and arrive by ship. Lots of our food items are transported by sea too and the fuel for our transport arrives in huge tanker ships.

Each year in July there is a special day to remember these seafarers who risk their lives and leave their families to bring us our essentials and our luxuries. This year Sea Sunday is on 10th July; so you may like to think about those working at sea or to say a prayer for them. (Also see the wordsearch on the next page.)

Many seafarers come from hot countries like the Philippines and leave their home dressed in shorts and t-shirts. Imagine what it would be like some weeks later to find yourself in the cold waters of the north with only overalls to keep you warm. The ports have a ready supply of warm garments to hand out including knitted hats, balaclavas, scarves and fingerless gloves. If you like to knit, you may like to join in. Patterns are available online or you can use your own and there is a Freepost address to send the garments to in London or if you are visiting London, you could drop them off at The Mission to Seafarers' headquarters at St. Michael Paternoster Royal Church, College Hill, London EC4R 2R1 (not far from St. Paul's Cathedral) where you would be able to have a look around the church which contains a stained glass window of Dick Whittington and his cat!! Their phone number is 0207 248 5202 or you could look online at The Mission to Seafarers website.

There are also opportunities to volunteer to serve at ports in the seafarers' centres, visit ships and do other voluntary work.

Sharon's Recipe - Sticky Date Cake

Ingredients

4oz / 110g raisins
8oz / 225g chopped dates
6 oz / 175g sultanas
4 oz / 110g currants
10 oz / 275g margarine
Half a pint of water (275 ml)
1 large tin condensed milk
5 oz / 150g plain flour
5 oz / 150g wholemeal flour
three-quarters tsp / 3.75 ml
bicarbonate of soda
A pinch of salt
1 generous tablespoon chunky
marmalade

Method

- Preheat oven to gas mark 3/170 degrees C/ 325 degrees F. Grease and line 8 inch / 20 cm square cake tin. Prepare a double square of greaseproof paper the same size as the tin with a hole in the middle the size of a 50 pence coin.
- Put all the fruit, margarine, water and condensed milk in a saucepan and bring to the boil. Stir frequently to avoid sticking. Simmer for 3 minutes stirring occasionally. Transfer to a large mixing bowl and let it cool for about 30 minutes.
- Sift the flours together with the salt and bicarbonate of soda, tip any bran left in the sieve into the mixture.
- When the fruit has cooled, stir it into the flour mix and add the marmalade. Mix well.
- Spoon mixture into the prepared tin and cover the cake with the greaseproof paper with a hole in the middle. Bake in the centre of the oven for 2.5 - 3 hours.
- Remove from the oven and let it cool in the tin for 5 minutes before turning it out onto a wire tray.

This cake will keep in an airtight tin for several weeks.

Each unit then made Lego models, before moving onto the next activity of fake tattoos and then having a well earned rest with a drink of squash. This then led onto flag making, crown making or kite making, depending on the age range. Each attendee left their finger print on the Queen's head before queuing for their turn at the inflatable goal.

It was then onto the numerous assault courses on offer; the girls got to catapult teddy across the school playing field and then catapult a tennis ball before moving onto welly wanging and the blindfold assault course. Lots of laughter and smiles again throughout this session. Then each unit had the opportunity to complete a relay race with a cup filled with water attached to a length of rope, and then they had to unhook and fill their coke bottle from the water left in the cup.

This provided the leaders with lots of laughter as the girls kept forgetting to unhook the cup from the string, resulting in water spraying everywhere. The scouts appeared to master this activity much better than the others.

It was then turn to go on the most exciting activity of the day – climbing. The girls organised themselves in order of height as instructed and patiently queued for their turn.

All units had the chance to make a badge. The older sections made these from wood, whilst younger members made a plastic badge or key ring to take home.

This led nicely into afternoon tea. It was so lovely to see all sections sitting and chatting away together and enjoying their sandwiches and accompaniments. We sang happy birthday to the Queen and then to one of the scout leaders whose birthday was on Sunday. Each child was given their party present of a drinking jar filled with sweets and their souvenir badges of the day. Also, everyone was given a slice of birthday cake and an ice lolly! This was a lovely touch to end such a wonderful afternoon.

We have received fabulous feedback from the helpers, leaders and activity leaders about how well behaved, polite and happy our guiding members were. We are so pleased to hear this. 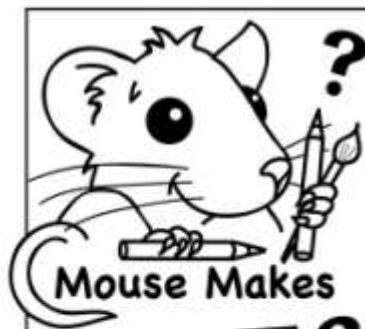
