We should be running for Christ, not ourselves, and we must always keep him in sight.

Jesus himself was required to trust that God was working his purposes out as he faced the cross. He did so by focusing on the "joy set before him". So, Jesus is our supreme example and also the means by which we are to live by faith and keep doing so in all circumstances.

Training for a sport, especially if you want to be at the top level of it, is never easy. As Christians we can expect at times to have to work

hard at our faith but we can look to Jesus to provide us with the strength, encouragement, peace and perseverance that is needed each day to follow him.

And finally remember that the Christian reward for running the race is "a crown of righteousness" (2 Timothy 4 v8), eternal life in the presence of God. What joy! A final victory worth running for and doing our best on the way.

May God help each one of us to run and succeed for Him.



TOYBOX

The Toybox charity was established in 1992 by a Christian couple who wanted to challenge the injustice of children living on the streets in some of the most dangerous cities in the world. They left England and went to live in Guatemala City where they came face to face with the horrors and dangers that the street children faced daily. Gradually they gained the trust of the children and helped many of the young children into a safe house where they lived as a family by feeding, clothing and helping them to receive an education.

Since then, Toybox have opened homes in Bolivia, El Salvador and Peru in Central and South America and are now helping street children in India and Kenya too. Toybox also provide day centres where children can come for food and care and to be able to be like children where they can play games together and have fun.

The United Nations estimates the number of street children around the world to be in the HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS. Hard to imagine isn't it? Some children are born on the streets to young mothers who are themselves street children, but not all street children were homeless. Many children are abandoned by parents who are too poor to cope and others have run away from their homes where their parents were abusive or violent towards them.

A street child has NO rights whatsoever and are considered the lowest of the low who live in danger from violent gangs, drug dealers and even from the police in some countries who beat them (and even worse). After being abused it is easy to understand why the children are afraid of adults; so it can take some time for the children to respond to adults who actually want to help them. Toybox also becomes a voice to speak up for those who noone takes notice of.

Toybox run a child ambassador programme, where a child who has been rescued from the streets then becomes an ambassador for other street children to try and help them to come off the street. Toybox are currently helping 18,000 street children each year.

Another scheme that Toybox are involved in is obtaining a birth certificate for a street child. A birth certificate is beyond the reach of a street child and without a birth certificate a child is denied an official education, cannot see a doctor when ill, is not allowed to get a job to earn an income, cannot get married or even be buried in an official cemetery. Although a birth certificate only costs £1 in Guatemala, this is often an item overlooked as many families only receive £1 in income a day with which to keep a whole family. Obtaining a birth certificate isn't an easy task as they need to search for the midwife who delivered the child, find 2 non-family witnesses, pay fines (for the child not being registered as a baby), pay other costs and taxes; so it is quite a long and expensive process and will not be possible for many street children who do not even know when they were born, but for those fortunate enough to receive a birth certificate it opens up the chance of a new life and is invaluable to the child. Around 2,000 children are now registered. The cost of obtaining one is around £32. A birth certificate is something most of us would take for granted and if you feel you'd like to be involved in buying one for a street child, this would make a wonderful gift for someone.

Wordsearch - St. Swithun - Saint for a rainy day

St. Swithun is the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. Swithun became Bishop of Winchester in 852, under King Ethelwulf of Wessex, in the days when Wessex was the most important kingdom of England. Swithun was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, all he asked was that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door. But on 15th July 971, the monks decided to move Swithun into their newly built cathedral. And so his bones were dug up. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was disturbed again in 1093, when he was moved into the new Winchester cathedral. So if it rains on 15th July....get out your umbrella!

Needles and Natter



April saw the start of a new venture in the library, a 2 hour session on Friday called 'Needles and Natter.'

Being a recent 'born again' knitter after a gap of at least 30 years, I thought I would try it, especially as my Mum enjoys knitting and so it is something we can enjoy together. I now look forward to it each week and I am sure that the other loyal band of regulars do too. For me, the 'nattering' takes priority over the 'needling' and I am delighted on the rare occasions that I succeed in knitting more than I undo.



Knitting is only one of the activities that people undertake at Needles and Natter; I have watched other ladies involved in embroidery, cross stitch,

Sharon's Recipe - Home-made Raspberry Jam - Makes 51b / 2.3 kg



At this time of year what better than to go and pick your own raspberries and make your own Jam – it's a good activity for the children in the holidays too.

Notes:

Fruit should be firm, under-ripe or just ripe and fresh (over-ripe fruit does not have a good level of pectin for setting jam)

The saucepan should be strong and roomy with a heavy base to prevent sticking and burning. There should be enough room to allow the jam to boil vigorously, the pan should be about half full when the sugar has been added. E.g. the bottom of a pressure cooker is a good pan to use

Scum will form and this should not be removed until the jam is made as too much skimming is wasteful. A small piece of butter rubbed over the bottom of the pan helps to reduce foaming and prevent sticking. When boiling has finished, remove scum with a metal spoon

Add sugar only when the fruit is well cooked and broken down, then boil the jam rapidly until setting point is reached


To test for setting, pour a tiny teaspoonful of the jam onto a cold saucer and leave for 1 minute. Setting point has been reached if the surface sets and crinkles when pushed with the finger. Remove the jam from the heat while this test is being made, otherwise it may boil too rapidly and the setting point may be missed. A sugar thermometer will register about 105°C (220°F) once setting point has been reached

After removing the scum, allow the jam to cool off slightly before pouring into perfectly clean, dry, warm jars

Jars should be filled to the brim with hot jam to allow for the shrinkage that takes place during cooling. After filling, press a well-fitted waxed disc on the surface of the jam in each jar and wipe the rim carefully with a hot, damp cloth. Cover the jam either while it is still very hot or completely cold.

Label the jam and date; store in a dry, dark, cool, ventilated cupboard.

Ingredients	Method
3 lb / 1.4 kg raspberries	Put fruit into a large saucepan and crush finely with back of wooden spoon.
3 lb / 1.4 kg granulated sugar	Simmer gently for 5 minutes
½ oz / 15g butter	Add sugar and stir until dissolved
	Bring to the boil. Boil briskly for 5-7 minutes or until setting point is reached
	Draw pan way from heat. Stir in butter to disperse scum
	Remove scum with a metal spoon
	Pot and cover
