In Mark Chapter 16, we read that after his resurrection on Easter Day Jesus appeared to his disciples one last time before he went back to his Father. He came to commission the disciples for their future role and in verse 15 he said 'Go into all the world and preach the good news to all creation'.

As believers in God we too are called to actively spread God's word and look to make a positive difference in our communities. But how do we do that?

Do we knock on doors and try to talk to people direct? People are rightly very wary when they see people they do not know on their doorsteps. It does not always provide a conducive environment to speak directly about Jesus.

To bring people to Jesus and make new disciples we need to build trust and contacts in the community through events such as the Sausage Sizzle. We need to show the Church is relevant in today's world and that we consist of ordinary people who have a faith and belief in Jesus. If we can demonstrate

that then people will want to explore what following Jesus would mean for them.

So while munching the sausages on July 6th we can reflect on how we, like those disciples in the early Church, are reaching out to our community in Hartshill of which we are very much a part.

FEBA (Far East Broadcasting Associates, now known as Feba Radio UK)

Feba are celebrating their 60th anniversary this year. As a Christian charity their motivation is to share God's Love with people in a relevant and accessible way, through radio and other media. In 1959 a group of British supporters established a station in the Seychelles which was a British Protectorate at the time and initially broadcast into India. By the 1970's Feba was regularly producing short wave broadcasts and had developed studios, offices, housing, transmitters and the offshore "reef" antenna system, enabling programmes to reach across parts of Africa, Asia and the Middle East. The transmitter in the Seychelles was used until 2003 when their way of working changed; a new partnership model was employed, which focused on enabling local partners and communities to use media for their own transformative change. Radio remains an important tool for many hard to reach communities and now as well as short wave, other means are used to transmit, including medium wave, community FM, or even internet and social media.

Feba's passion and commitment as Christians is to empower people to live with dignity and enjoy life in all its fullness. Local partners are trained to develop networks in their own countries as the radio is used to deliver life saving information such as where to find food, water and shelter in the aftermath of a natural disaster. Broadcasts also cover health and sanitation advice, farming techniques or addressing issues of abuse and people trafficking and where to find help. We often forget that people in poorer countries are illiterate and so are unable to read information that we take for granted at being able to access via clinics, libraries or on our own computers etc; so for villagers to be able to hear messages on a radio can be life saving.

In many countries, Christians are a minority group and many also suffer persecution for their faith. Broadcasting brings hope to persecuted communities, who often meet together in secret in people's homes. To hear from their brothers and sisters in Christ over the radio can give them spiritual support and encouragement and they feel part of the wider, international church family. Some believers are so isolated and alone that they feel as if they are the only Christian in the country and its an enormous encouragement when they tune in and realize they are not alone after all. We can't even begin to imagine how life can be for our fellow believers can we? We are so fortunate in this country to be able to attend church in freedom, when we want to and meet up with our Christian friends for social events too. It is good for us to remember (and pray for) our Christian brothers and sisters who do not have this freedom.


Ingredients

Baking Parchment is required Grease a 23 cm tart tin 150g short crust pastry already made or bought 110g cherries, stoned and halved ½ tbsp. vanilla extract 25g raspberries 25g blueberries 1 egg, plus 1 egg yolk 45g caster sugar 10g plain flour 25g ground almonds 50ml whole milk 60ml single cream 1½ tbsp. flaked almonds Icing Sugar to serve Extra flaked almonds to serve

Method

- Preheat oven to gas mark 6/200 degrees C electric oven or 180 degrees C Fan.
- Toss the cherries in the vanilla extract and roast in the oven for 6-8 minutes until beginning to soften. Remove from oven, then stir in the raspberries and blueberries and set aside.
- 3. Meanwhile Grease the tin and line with the rolled pastry. Prick the base, line with baking parchment and fill with baking beans. Bake for 15 minutes, then remove the beans and parchment and cook for a further 5 minutes.
- 4. Whisk together the egg, egg yolk, sugar, flour, ground almonds, milk and cream. Scatter the fruit over the pastry base, pour over the egg mixture and top with flaked almonds. Reduce the oven temperature to Gas Mark 4 / 180 degrees C / 160 degrees C fan and cook for 20 minutes, or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean.
- **5.** Dust with icing sugar and top with extra flaked almonds to serve.



Eco tips for July



The "Plastic Free July" movement challenges us to refuse single-use plastic this month. The plastic bottles, bags and takeaway containers that we use just for a few minutes use a material that is designed to last forever. Every bit of plastic ever made still exists and in the first 10 years of this century the world economy produced more plastic than the entire 1900's! These products break up, not break down; are mostly made into low grade product for just one more use or sent to landfill; end up in waterways and the ocean (where scientists predict there will be more tonnes of plastic than tonnes of fish by 2050); transfer to the food chain – carrying pollutants with them; increase our eco-footprint – plastic manufacturing consumes 6% of the world's fossil fuels.

Alternatives to many plastic items are available (some suggestions are at www.plasticfreejuly.org/a-z-alternatives.html) and although they are sometimes not as cheap the benefits to our environment are huge. You can find alternatives in shops such as Romeys's Organic Bliss and Peppercorn, as well as online.

This week's eco tip: Go prepared: if you are going out and think you will be offered plastic utensils, cups and plates (including polystyrene) then you might like to take your own reusable alternatives. Refuse drinking straws and balloons etc. All of these can escape as litter from events, bins, bin lorries etc to become non-degradable 'accidental litter'.

This week's eco tip: When replacing a plastic item consider plant-based alternatives. For example bamboo or wooden toothbrushes, and tooth powder in tins or glass jars.

This week's eco tip: Instead of using cling film (which is non-degradable), more sustainable alternatives that includes aluminium foil, greaseproof paper or a "bee's wrap": these wax and organic cotton wraps are reusable and are fully biodegradable, compostable and plastic-free.

This week's eco tip: Is soap on your shopping list? A bar of soap is more sustainable than a pump dispenser, especially if it comes in a cardboard

carton. Soap-on-a-rope is an alternative to a plastic bottle of shower gel.

This week's eco tip: Can you wear it again? Every time synthetic fabrics are washed they shed microfibres which are the main cause of micro plastic contamination of the oceans (also known as "plastic soup"). This is ingested by fish and makes its way into our food chain.

Eco tips for August

This month we are looking at a variety of ways that we can make a difference to the world around us.

This week's eco tip: Bothered by mozzies in the garden? Instead of grabbing a bug spray, try putting a plant that they hate near to where you sit: rosemary, marigolds, lemongrass, lemon balm, lemon thyme, catnip, garlic, lavender, basil. Not only will you, bees and butterflies enjoy these, but you could avoid being bitten.

This week's eco tip: Have a smashing time at the bottle bank and help the environment. Glass is 100% recyclable and can be used again and again. 1 recycled glass bottle would save enough energy to power a computer for 25 minutes. Glass that is thrown away and ends up in landfills will never decompose.

This week's eco tip: Plan your car journeys to give yourself time to reduce fuel consumption. According to the Slower Speeds Initiative, driving at 50mph instead of 70mph can reduce fuel consumption further by 30%.




