

ROYAL NATIONAL MISSION TO DEEP SEA FISHERMEN

This is a very old mission society, as it began in 1881, under the banner of "Preach the Word, Heal the Sick". In those early days they brought food and medical supplies to the fishermen while they worked, trying to alleviate the terrible conditions on board. Since then the fishing industry has undergone many changes and the Mission has responded in many different ways.

They provided large accommodation centres to provide a safe place for fishermen to rest or stay when their boats came in, sometimes many miles from home. Nowadays, the little fishing boats have sleeping facilities on board, so the Mission provide 24 hour mini-centres with good facilities and welfare offices all around the coast of the UK. More than 13,000 people work in fishing and it is the UK's toughest and most dangerous peacetime occupation. At sea they face death and injury with an average of 15 fishermen killed or seriously injured each year.

The Fishermen's Mission is a lifeline for many and plays a vital role in fighting poverty and despair in fishing communities. They provide emergency and welfare support to the fishermen and their families 24 hours a day, every day of the year and give immediate assistance to the families where fishermen have been killed or injured.

They look after survivors of fishing boat accidents by finding medical help, a bed for the night or by providing a hot meal and dry clothes. They also alleviate loneliness by visiting retired fishermen and their families at home or in hospital.

Fishing boats are often small and fishermen often work alone on their own small boat. They can set off from port in calm waters and a short time later find themselves in stormy rough seas, as day in, day out they bring in their catch of fish. I wouldn't like to be at sea in a violent storm in the largest of liners, never mind being in a small fishing boat!

Here in the Midlands we couldn't be further from the sea; so we may not think too much about how the fish on our plates actually got there.

Fishermen's Mission is an ecumenical charity and maintains a positive, loyal and trusted Christian presence in the fishing communities as they seek to make Christ's love real by offering practical and pastoral help and sharing His compassion by example and service.

Knitted Poppies

At our meeting on 13th June, we will be crafting poppies for Warwick Poppies 2018. If you would like to join us, as always, you are very welcome. We will have patterns available for knitted, crocheted and felt poppies. Bring your own yarn and needles if you have them but we will also have some spare. As a taster, here is a knitting pattern.



For the best finish, knit with a Double Knit (DK yarn). The size of needle you choose will determine how big the poppy will be, but we recommend 3.5mm or 3.75mm (UK9).

1 ball red yarn (this will make a lot of poppies) Scrap of black yarn or black button for centre.

Body of Poppy

Using red, cast on 60 stitches

Rows1 –8: K3, P3 across whole row

For a knitted black centre, change to black yarn. If not, continue in red.

Row 9: Knit 2 stitches together across the row (30 stitches).

Row 10: Slip 1 stitch, Knit 2 stitches together then pass the slip stitch over... repeat across the whole row (10 stitches).

Break off yarn with long tail and thread back through remaining stitches and pull tight. Join edges.

Sharon's Recipe - Blueberry Bakewell Muffins

Makes 12

Ingredients Muffins

100g butter softened 140g castor sugar 2 large eggs 140g natural yogurt 1 tsp vanilla essence 1 tsp almond extract 2 tbsp milk 250g plain flour 2 tsp baking powder 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda 1/4 tsp fine salt 150g fresh or frozen blueberries

Ingredients Topping


3 tbsp demerara sugar ½ tsp ground cinnamon 3 tbsp flaked almonds, roughly shopped 2 tbsp ground almonds 3 tbsp plain flour 1 tbsp cold butter diced 12 tsp blueberry conserve

Method

- Preheat oven to gas mark 6/200 degrees C / 180 degrees C Fan. Line muffin tin trays with paper muffin cases
- 2. Put the topping ingredients, apart from the conserve, in a bowl and rub together, then set aside.
- 3. Beat the butter and caster sugar together until pale and fluffy. Add the eggs and beat for 1 minute, then mix in the yogurt, extracts and milk. Combine the flour, baking powder and bicarb in a bowl with ¼ tsp salt. Tip this into the wet ingredients and stir in. Finally fold in the blueberries and divide the mixture between the muffin cases. Top each muffin with 1 tsp conserve then scatter over the crumble mixture.
- 4. Bake for 5 minutes, then reduce the oven to gas mark 4 / 180 degrees C / 160 degrees C Fan and bake for about 15-18 minutes or until risen and golden, and a cocktail stick inserted in comes out with just conserve on it
- 5. Cool in the tins for 10 minutes, then carefully lift out onto a wire rack to finish cooling.

These will keep for 3-4 days in an airtight container.




