Pilgrimage

In April Carol and I, along with Steve and Rachel Hopkins, walked the final 120 kilometres (around 75 miles) of the Camino. This is an ancient pilgrim trail also known as 'The Way of St. James' and ends in the North Western Spanish city of Santiago De Compostela. Upon completion all pilgrims are issued with a certificate to mark their achievement. Many people walk the Camino, with annual visitor numbers reaching over 300,000 in 2018, the most popular months being July and August.

People have walked this way for centuries and everyone has their own reason for doing it. When you are walking for six to eight hours each day you have plenty of time to think and contemplate; life, faith, purpose and other things. We met many other pilgrims who were walking this route, some had started in Southern France and would go on to complete over 800km (500 miles), they were from all over the world including South Korea, Australia, Denmark and Germany.

Arriving in Santiago on Good Friday we witnessed many processions through the streets of the city with different 'brotherhoods' wearing different costumes and carrying heavy wooden crosses or symbols of the Easter story. It really was a fantastic sight to behold only exceeded by our visit to the Cathedral of St. James which was magnificent in all its gold leaf decorated glory. At a time when we are told Christianity is in decline it was uplifting and affirming to be amongst these 'brothers and sisters in Christ'. A truly memorable experience and one that all four of us will remember with fondness and humility for the rest of our lives.

We are coming up to our annual Trinity Sunday 'Gift Day' in church where we are given a specific opportunity to review the use and giving of our gifts to God and the church. You may wish to consider joining one of the rotas in church — especially offering to help with teas & coffees after the service and/or setting up the table for communion or helping as a duty warden (training is available for any new role.) If you are interested let Nick BB know and he will happily add you to the rota.

We also specifically look at our financial giving to the church. If you don't already give by direct debit – and would like to find out more – please speak to Wendy. You may want to review how much you already give and consider increasing it if you haven't already done so for several years. Please hear me when I say what you give is between you and God which is why we say prayerfully consider it – whilst recognising that we can never out-give God. Some Christians follow the principal of tithing (giving 10% of our income) which to some may seem quite high. However, if we also take seriously our offertory prayer (from the bible) that all things come from God and of His own we give to Him – then someone once suggested rather than seeing it as giving 10% it's actually God's grace of letting us keep 90%!

Finally – there will be Gift Day envelopes available at the back of church for the next few weeks if you feel called to give an extra amount to the church for its service and mission to the community. We don't get external funding from governments or organisations and so rely on the generosity of people to keep the church running and functioning – including the £20,000+ a year we have to give to the Diocese as part of the running costs of the parish.

I firmly believe and have seen first hand the other biblical principle that giving in itself is a gift as it is indeed "more blessed to give than to receive"

 $-\ so$ may you know God's blessing to you this gift day.

Betel began around 30 years ago, near Madrid in Spain, when a small group of missionaries from a larger charity (WEC International, featured in an earlier magazine article) began to care for the needs of a few drug addicts and marginalized people. Today Betel (Spanish for Bethel) can be found in 24 nations, in over 100 urban areas and they run residences for men and women whose lives have been ruined by drug and alcohol abuse. Their aim is to bring long term freedom and restoration to people affected by these addictions and their end goal is to help people become productive, trustworthy men and women of character when they leave the community. They place emphasis on the restoration of the personality through the Gospel and aim to bring every person to the power of Jesus Christ and the benefits of His Love and Healing.

Betel belongs to the Evangelical Alliance and relates to various Christian alliances in most of the countries which they work in and also receive added assistance from respected secular organizations. They also work closely with local authorities, the Police and Probation services and prisons to provide assistance for the neediest individuals in society.

Their residences are free of charge but are also alcohol, tobacco and drug free places, strictly adhered to. They operate an open door policy i.e. easy entrance and easy exit; so people entering their residences do so voluntarily and retain the right to leave whenever they wish. As a guideline they suggest residents join for at least one year, but there is no time limit. They also encourage the family of the addict to be involved in the restoration process and are invited to participate in their open meetings, in the belief

that if they can make one person whole, he or she will contribute to make a family whole again.

Residents live in a safe, structured, family-like environment and from 7am to 11pm days consist of learning to co-operate and work with others, whether tidying the house, preparing a meal or working in a Betel workshop or business as time goes on. Each new resident is assigned a responsible or more experienced Betel member to help them learn the daily routine and someone to talk to. Each morning begins with a half hour group devotional and worship; and each evening consists of a quiet hour and also worship and Bible discussion groups. There are also leisure activities and games available.

Over the years many men and women healed from their addiction have become Betel leaders and the vast majority of the centres are now run entirely by former residents.

Drug and alcohol addiction is a worldwide problem and occurs in almost every country and people can be addicts from whatever background, rich or poor, from good, happy homes as well as from unhappy or neglectful homes.

As well as restoring broken lives, one of Betel's businesses is restoring furniture. The work is done by residents and the furniture is then sold in Betel's charity shops. Another venture is Rising Cafes and one is based in Coventry Cathedral which is open Monday - Saturday from 10.30am - 4.30pm, serving lunches and afternoon teas and operated by Betel's residents. Money from these businesses goes directly towards helping more people on their road to recovery.

Betel also offers internships to young Christians for a few months at a time and this includes overseas placements.

Maybe you know someone who is addicted and would like help to come off drugs etc. and could benefit from Betel's help. If so, you may like to pass on the contact details to them or their family.

Sharon's Recipe - Strawberry Cheesecake

50g (2oz) butter, melted

100g (4oz) digestive biscuits, crushed

135g (4½oz) packet strawberry jelly

225g (8oz) soft cheese, softened

150g (5oz) natural yogurt

150ml (5 fl oz) double cream, softly whipped

125g (5oz) fresh strawberries – half chopped small.

20.5cm (8 inch) greased loose-bottomed cake tin.

Method

Mix butter and biscuit crumbs together. Press into the base of the greased loose-bottomed 20.5cm cake tin and chill.

Dissolve jelly in 150ml (¼ pt) hot water and leave to cool but not set.

Beat together cheese and yogurt and gradually stir in the cool jelly and mix well.

Fold the cream into the cheese, yogurt and jelly mixture

Gently stir in the chopped strawberries (the other half of the strawberries are for decoration)

Pour mixture onto the biscuit base and chill until set.


Remove from the tin and decorate with the rest of the strawberries – they look good sliced and laid on top but decorate anyway you like.

Serve immediately or keep chilled for up to 24 hours.


