Strange times

I write this letter as we enter our eighth week in 'lockdown'.

Since the arrival of the Corona Virus, or Covid-19 as it is now often called, life as we know it has changed considerably. The church buildings are closed; worship gatherings are not permitted and special services, including weddings and baptisms are on hold. Funeral families are restricted to a simple Committal service at the Crematorium or a graveside Committal in the Cemetery - with both types of service subject to restricted attendance numbers and 'social distancing' rules. In addition to church restrictions we cannot see our families and hugs and kisses from grown up children (and grandchildren) are sorely missed.

And yet, in amongst all the sadness and worry we see great signs of caring in our communities. Volunteers are delivering prescriptions, going shopping for neighbours and phoning for a chat to stay in touch with those most at risk. This is happening, not just in Hartshill and Galley Common, but up and down the UK I am sure.

Our Sunday virtual service at 10:00am each week offers a chance to come together while apart, to stay in contact with God and to hear the word of the Lord. This, for me, renews my **Faith** each week and gives me a feeling of unity with God and with my church family. The Sermons have been emotional and inspiring and if I had to pick one theme that has been seen in each service I would say it is **Hope**. It is during difficult and

challenging times that the important things come to the fore. What was important a few weeks ago now pales into insignificance. New phrases have emerged like; 'The new normal', 'We must keep R below 1' and 'Clap for the NHS' - and daily press briefings are now expected. Within all this I feel a renewed sense of **Love** has been established in our daily lives. So as I reflect on these 'Strange Times' I am mindful of:

1 Corinthians Chapter 13 v13 And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION (YMCA)

On 6th June, 1844, a 22 year old draper, George Williams, along with 11 friends met together for Bible study and prayer forming the first YMCA for young men seeking escape from the hazards of life on the streets of London. Today, still inspired and faithful to their Christian values, they create supportive, inclusive and energizing communities where young people can truly belong, contribute and thrive. It is the oldest and largest youth charity in the world and they now serve more than 60 million people in 120 countries. In England and Wales they support 228,000 young people every year in a variety of ways. (The organization for women YWCA was founded in the 1850's and is still active too over the world, but as YMCA help both male and female young people now, I will just refer to the YMCA).

But back to the 1840's. Soon after the formation of the YMCA, public lectures and education classes were developed and reading rooms and refreshment areas were set up. Within a year, branches opened in Manchester and Leeds and a few years later YMCA spread across the world. In 1873 the first holiday centre opened on the Isle of Wight which was hugely popular as you can imagine and led to another 25 centres opening. Later on, gyms were opened and sporting events were set up. In 1912 the first purpose built hostels were opened in Cardiff and London. After the First World War a YMCA employment department was established to help deal with unemployment and finding jobs for exservicemen. During WW2 they introduced mobile canteens bringing refreshments to the troops and also supported displaced persons, refugees and prisoners of war. By the end of the 1950's there was concern about the need for better leisure facilities for teenagers which resulted in many local YMCA's beginning youth clubs. In 1970 the YMCA George Williams College was established in London providing training programmes for


professional youth workers and the college today is one of the leading trainers for informal education. YMCA Training has supported over a million people to date.

Since that small beginning in 1844 YMCA now works with young men and women, regardless of race, religion or culture, to help young people build a future. It is the largest provider of safe, supportive accommodation for young people in England and Wales, offering over 9,000 beds - from emergency accommodation to supported longer term housing and also youth hostels, not just offering a bed but also the help to enable a young person gain the training skills and confidence to go on to lead independent lives.

YMCA are also involved in family work which includes creches, nurseries, school clubs, holiday clubs and camps, youth work, respite for young carers, parenting programmes and family mediation. They also provide health and well being gyms, exercise classes, swimming pools and sports groups which include disability programmes, rehabilitative and special care, and support and advice seeing young people through difficult times with a wide range of services.

There are many opportunities for volunteering with YMCA and also for paid work with the organization in around 600 communities across England and Wales in youth work, sports activities and other areas, and there are many YMCA charity shops too which need volunteers. Our local cities of Coventry, Leicester and Birmingham have YMCA groups.

David's brothers were not came to watch the fight. Go back to your few sheep,











Sharou's Recipe - Orange and Raspberry Cheesecake - Serves 8

Preparation 25 minutes + at least 4 hours chilling time

Ingredients	Method	
225g digestive	Put the biscuits into a large plastic bowl and	
biscuits	crush them with a wooden spoon until they are	
	crumbs	
50g tbsp butter,		
melted	Mix in the melted butter and press mixture into	
	a 23cm cheesecake tin with a loose bottom, to	
400g full fat cream	form a firm base that is evenly spread. Put into	
cheese (e.g.	the fridge for about 30 minutes to set.	
Philadelphia)		
	Put the cream cheese, orange zest, mascarpone,	
Zest of 3 oranges	sugar and milk into a bowl and mix it well with	
	a wooden spoon.	
Segments of the 3		
oranges above	Put the cream in a clean bowl and whisk until it	
	is like thick custard (not too stiff and not fluffy)	
200g mascarpone		
cheese	Add the orange mixture to the cream and	
	combine thoroughly.	
100g caster sugar		
	Remove the cheesecake biscuit base from the	
2 tbsp milk	fridge and pour the filling over and spread it	
	evenly.	
184ml double cream		
	Refrigerate for at least 4 hours	
250g raspberries		
	Decorate with the orange segments and the	
	raspberries before serving.	



Obviously due the measures taken to deal with the coronavirus we are not able to continue with the bringing of items to Church or deliveries to the warehouse.

This is at a time when the Food Bank is under huge pressure, especially with schools closed.

In the three weeks from April 19th, the food bank has distributed food to 332 people including 104 children (9.26 tons)

The food bank is still working with its volunteers and there are collection points in most supermarkets. Please note, they are no longer able to accept infant formula milk or baby food due to a UNICEF directive.


