CARRIERS OF HOPE

This is a fairly new charity and also a local one too, which was started in May 2009. People noticed that there were a number of refugees and asylum seekers living in the Coventry area who were experiencing extreme poverty and lacking the most basic personal household items.

They started by preparing and handing out carrier bags of useful items - hence the name Carriers of Hope. The size of the problem quickly became apparent and they started to have an open morning on Tuesdays in a church hall where families could come and receive a welcome, refreshments and support and also the opportunity to collect food items, clothing and other essential items, donated by the public.

In 2012 they moved to Hillfields Evangelical Baptist Church and they also have a warehouse a couple of miles away, which is used as an equipment and furniture store. Since the charity started they have helped families from over 60 different countries. Although the images of refugees fleeing their countries seem to have vanished from our TV screens, refugees and persecuted people from places like Syria are still arriving with very few possessions (if any) as they flee for their lives from dangerous situations, which we can't even begin to imagine.

As so often happens, charities start in a little way and quickly become much larger affairs. The carrier bag idea spread greatly and they now supply items which wouldn't fit into a carrier bag! As well as the original items of food and clothing, they now supply bedding, furniture, kitchenware and baby equipment.

The Tuesday morning "at home" sessions run from 9 - 10.30 am at the church in Waterloo Street, Coventry, by a group called Circle of Friends and around 130 people turn up each week. Visitors are welcome at the open mornings as they feel that is the best way to understand more about them.

They run a furniture project, collecting items no longer needed by people who kindly donate and they pass them on to families who do need them. They also deliver baby bags to expectant mums with everything they need for their hospital stay and provide the equipment needed for a new baby at home.

Volunteers visit new families, taking a "Welcome to Coventry" bag and assess the families who need more help, which includes providing a school uniform distribution scheme and taking toys to children who have none.

They deliver emergency packs to people moving into an empty property, containing something to cook on, something to sleep on, something to sit on, pots and pans, cutlery, crockery and bedding etc.

On Wednesday mornings (9.15 - 11.15) they run "Lets Play", a learn to speak English together through a play group, for parents and toddlers, held at the church.

There are many volunteers needed at the church/warehouse and many of the volunteers are from the families who attend the centre, but new volunteers are always needed and the church provides training courses.

Maybe you would like to donate something you no longer need, for instance a pair of curtains sitting in a drawer which no longer suit your decor and will probably never be used again. You may like to take it yourself and visit the centre at the same time; but if you don't have

transport, their volunteers will collect by car or van. There are some restrictions of items needed so please check beforehand.

We are delighted that Mothers' Union will once again be hosting: Thy Kingdom Come Global Service at Coventry Cathedral.



COLOURS IN CHURCH

Have you noticed that, from time to time, the colour of things in church changes? No, I don't mean the minister goes a funny colour or someone paints the walls, but the special robes that the priest wears, and the front of among other things, change from time to time. Each season of the Church's year has its own distinctive colour and liturgical these called are colours.

GREEN is the colour we have more than others. Green, the ordinary colour of nature, is used during the seasons of Epiphany (after Christmas) and Trinity (between Whitsun or Pentecost and Advent). Trinity lasts for about half the year so green is the colour we see most.

The next change of colour is to PURPLE. Purple, the colour of penitence and preparation, is used for Lent (the 40 days before Easter) and Advent (the 4 weeks before Christmas).

Then comes WHITE and GOLD, which are used for all the joyful festivals - Easter, Ascension and Christmas.

RED, the colour of fire and blood, is used at Pentecost to remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples like tongues of flame (Acts 2:11). It is also used on the festivals of martyrs to remind us of their sacrifice.

Eco tips for May



Now is a good time to be thinking about growing summer flowers and vegetables so this month we're looking at ways we can be more "green" in our patch, whether we've got a garden, balcony, allotment, window box, hanging basket, or pots and tubs.

This week's eco tip: create a larder for bees. Choose flowers that bees can get into easily and provide them with a banquet of food. Some useful information is online here:

This week's eco tip: plan for slugs. When it comes to sowing and planting, assume you'll have some casualties and plant more than you need. When planting out seedlings, make a circle of crushed eggshells around each one – slugs don't like crawling on a rough ground.

This week's eco tip: protect your seedlings from frost, slugs and mice. Make mini greenhouses from clear plastic bottles: remove the screw top, cut off the base and push the sawn-off bottle over the seedling and into the soil.

This week's eco tip: don't be too tidy. Leave a patch of leaves and twigs where bugs and beetles can feel at home: they could be your friends by feasting on the less welcome insects that eat your plants.




