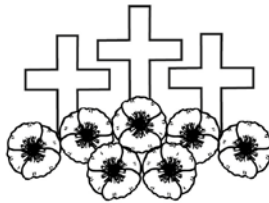

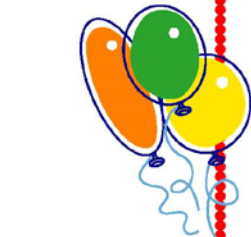

CHRISTIAN CHARITY NEWS

AIM FOR CHANGE

Aim for Change is a relatively "new" charity being founded in 2003 by Ruth James from Leicestershire. On a visit to Uganda Ruth saw the overwhelming need for the rural poor of Uganda to be able to educate their children and knew that she needed to do something to help.

Our Mothers' Union group have had the privilege of hearing Ruth speak and have seen the photographs and slides of the work the charity does in providing education, healthcare and self-sufficiency projects to many underprivileged and vulnerable children and adults in remote parts of Uganda and Pakistan and about her vision and God's guidance into how she set up the charity.

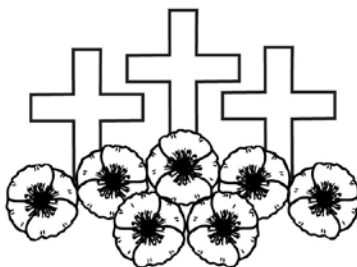
There are large numbers of children still living on the streets in the towns and cities in Uganda as indeed there are in many places in the world. Aim for Change built a home for the street children in Mbarara, south Uganda giving a chance of education to the children (free state education is not provided in Uganda). As the children grew older a workshop for carpentry was set up at the home, which now runs as a business and a further workshop for welding has been constructed to train young men to produce work of a high quality. The charity also provides animals for breeding programmes, taxi bicycles and sewing machines to provide work and therefore funds to run the home. In 2011 a freshwater borehole was installed and this is used also by the local community.

Aim for Change began to work in Pakistan in 2006 after a massive earthquake in 2005 devastated the region; supporting refugees, schools, vocational training and an orphanage.

Our church also supports Aim for Change from our Harvest Auction.

Ruth has an amazing story to tell; she is an inspirational and passionate speaker. 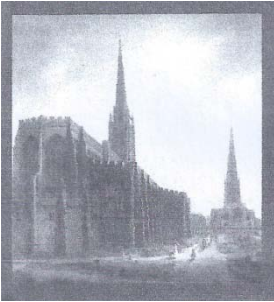

Coventry Cathedral before the bombing

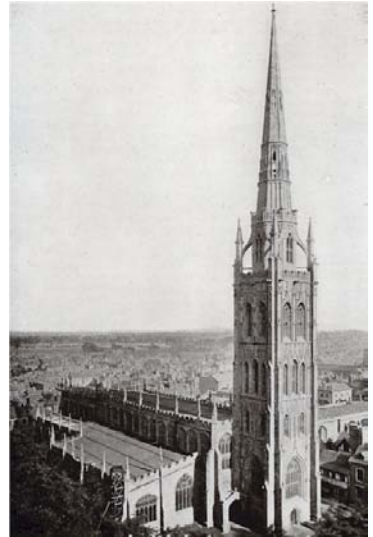
Many thanks to John Pettifer for allowing me to largely reproduce the article he wrote for the magazine of St Paul's, Stockingford.

We all have seen images of the devastation caused by the bombing of Coventry Cathedral in 1940, but it occurred to me during the period of remembrance, what did it look like prior to this awful event? Prompted by a postcard given to me by a friend, a search revealed some very interesting images.



The first is very early as there are no buildings adjacent, just grass and open spaces.

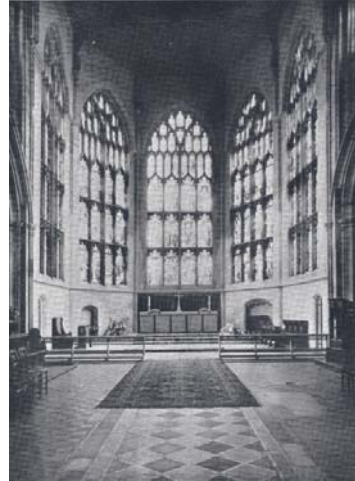
The second is of the west door with the very prominent tall tower being its main feature (the third tallest in England, 295 ft) .



The others are of the interior. It had a very large interior and could accommodate several hundred worshipers. The interior was very beautiful with fluted columns and arches and a well lit and open uncluttered chancel and sanctuary. The

triple east window is clearly as we see today in the ruins.

The north aisle was double the depth for most of the length of its western end, presumably used as a social area, just speculating. Very little can be seen of the south aisle in the pictures and so I assume a single depth from the ruin pictures

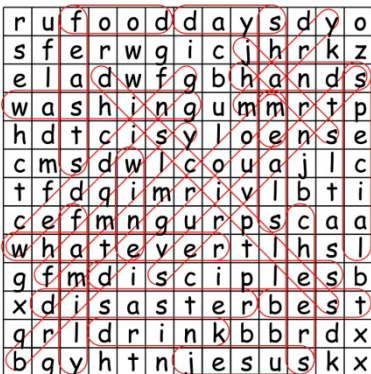

Ever wonder why we've failed to find life on any other planet, yet ours is designed to sustain us and meet our most basic everyday needs? It makes you wonder, doesn't it? Do you think it's just a coincidence? Not according to the Bible. In it God says, 'I... made the earth and created mankind upon it'. Did you know that if the earth was 10 per cent larger or 10 per cent smaller, life as we know it wouldn't be possible? Or that we're just the right distance from the sun so we receive the right amount of heat and light. If we were any farther away we'd freeze, and if we were closer we wouldn't be able to survive. Consider for a moment the amazing tilt of the axis of the earth. None of the other planets are tilted like ours at 23 degrees. This angle allows the sun's rays to touch every part of the earth's surface over the course of a year, as the earth circles the sun. If there was no tilt to the axis, the poles would accumulate enormous masses of ice, and the centre of the earth would become so hot we couldn't stand it. Like an excited parent designing a room for the arrival of their newborn child, God made this earth specifically for us. **'For this is what the LORD says - he who created the heavens, he is God; he who fashioned and made the earth, he founded it; he did not create it to be empty, but formed it to be inhabited'** Isaiah 45:18

A short story from the Bible

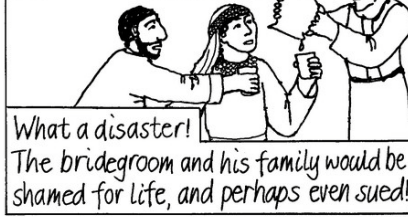
It can be read in the Bible in John chapter 2 verses 1 to 10

Jesus, his mother, and his disciples were guests at a family wedding in Cana. The bridegroom was responsible for the food and drink.

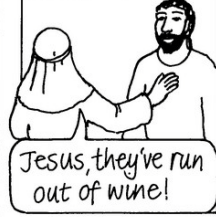
The wedding feasts went on for days

Sharon's Recipe – Christmas Log

<p>Ingredients Cake 4 large eggs 4oz / 100g caster sugar 2½ oz / 65g self-raising flour 1½ oz / 40g cocoa powder</p> <p>Ingredients Filling 1 tbsp strong black coffee 4 tbsp hot milk 8oz / 225g unsweetened chestnut puree 2oz / 50g caster sugar ½ pint / 150ml double cream, whipped 2 tbsp brandy (or extra milk for non-alcoholic version)</p> <p>Ingredients Topping ½ pint / 330ml double cream, whipped Cocoa powder to dust Holly leaves to decorate</p>	<p>Method Roll</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Preheat oven to gas mark 7/220 degrees C Fan / 200 degrees C non-Fan. Grease and line 13x8in Swiss roll tin with non-stick baking parchment2. Whisk the eggs and sugar together in a large bowl until the mixture is light and frothy and the whisk leaves a trail when lifted out3. Sift the flour and cocoa powder together into the mixture, carefully fold it in. Turn the mixture into the tin and give it a gentle shake so that the mixture finds its own level, making sure that it spreads evenly into the corners.4. Bake for about 10 minutes until the sponge begins to shrink from the edges of the tin5. While the sponge is cooking, place a piece of non-stick baking parchment that is bigger than the size of the tin onto a work surface and sprinkle it with caster sugar6. Once the cake is cooked, invert it onto the sugared parchment. Quickly loosen the parchment on the bottom of the cake and peel it off. Trim the edges of the sponge with a sharp knife and make a score mark 2.5cm (1 in) from the shorter edge, being careful not to cut right through7. After leaving to cool slightly, roll up gently in the baking parchment and leave to cool completely P.T.O.

Method Filling

Mix the coffee with the milk, push the chestnut puree through a sieve into a bowl and beat in the coffee mixture and the sugar until the mixture is smooth. Fold the whipped cream into the chestnut puree along with the brandy if using or extra milk to mix to a good spreading consistency

To Assemble

Carefully unroll the Swiss roll. Remove the parchment and spread the chestnut filling over the cake, then re-roll. Cut a small slice of at an angle from one of the ends of the Swiss roll. Place the Swiss roll onto a serving plate or board, and attach the slice to look like a branch. Spread the whipped cream over the cake to cover completely, using a small palette knife in long strokes to give a bark effect. Dust lightly with cocoa and decorate with holly leaves.
