toilet twinning

Toilets - not something we probably talk about much. Is it something we take for granted? Do you have one up, one down? Maybe some of us older people reminisce about visiting our grandparents outside toilets out on the yard, or down the bottom of the garden. I imagine everyone reading this has at least one indoor toilet. No more dashing outside in the rain or snow to "go".

However, for 40% of the world's population, some 2.5 billion people, life without a toilet is a reality and life without sanitation is dangerous.

Every minute, 3 children under the age of 5 die because of dirty water and poor sanitation. Time how long it takes you to read this article to see how many children have just died for this reason. In Africa, half of young girls who drop out of school do so because they need to collect water or because the school hasn't got a basic toilet. In poor countries, diarrhoea is a killer and the disease is easily spread where there is no sanitation. Many women and girls are bitten by snakes as they squat in the grass.

In 2008 someone from Cord (a Christian charity) came up with the idea of twinning their toilet and the first toilet was built in Burundi. Some time later Cord joined with Tearfund and the idea soon multiplied into providing toilets and sanitation in many other countries. Since 2015 Tearfund took on the baton and toilets are now springing up in 40 countries.

Of course, it's not just a matter of taking a toilet and putting it somewhere plumbing and clean water come into it too, plus hygiene education. Different countries have different styles, some places don't have water available for flushing and these require deep pit latrines being dug with a shelter built above it to give privacy and dignity to the user.

Some toilets in different countries cost less than others, but on average, it works out to about £60 and Toilet Twinning's scheme is for people or organizations to donate £60 to buy a toilet. Some schools have twinned with schools abroad and provided toilets for them and the children here learn about the way of life for other children in far off lands.

Anyone, twinning their toilet and donating the £60 receives a framed certificate with a photograph of the toilet shed and in recent months I have seen 3 of these certificates hanging in toilets, which I have used, the latest being last month, when I visited the cafe at The Vine, the Christian bookshop in Hinckley.

Once again, we see that the idea of one person doing something for one other person or group of people, spread quickly from that one toilet in Burundi, to many thousands across the world, changing and saving lives for a family, a village or a school. If you'd like to do something but can't afford to "twin your toilet", you may like to pay for toilet rolls, available at £8.

Sharon's Recipe - Fruit Sorbet

Ingredients

6 mint leaves or ½ tsp dried mint
Juice of 1 small lemon
Grated rind and strained juice of 1 medium orange
1 egg white
1 oz caster sugar
Orange slices to decorate

Method

- 1. Put granulated sugar, ¼ pint / 150ml water and mint into a pan
- 2. Cook over a low heat and stir until sugar dissolves
- 3. Remove from the heat and strain. Stir in ½ pint / 300 ml water, lemon juice, orange rind and juice
- 4. Mix well. Pour into a freezer container and chill until cold.
- 5. Freeze for 1 hour or until mixture has half frozen
- 6. Beat egg white to a stiff snow. Add caster sugar. Continue whisking until white is very stiff and shiny.
- 7. Pour fruit mixture into a chilled bowl. Whisk until smooth.
- 8. Gently fold in beaten egg white.
- Return to a clean container. Freeze for 45 minutes and whisk again.
- 10. Pour back into container. Freeze for 1½ hours-2 hours or until firm.
- 11. Spoon into small dishes and decorate with orange slices
- 12. Serve immediately

Lemon Sorbet

Follow recipe and method for tangy fruit sorbet but omit mint, orange rind and juice. Instead use the grated rind and juice of 4 lemons.

Strawberry Sorbet

Follow recipe and method for tangy fruit sorbet. Omit mint, orange rind and juice. Use 1 lb / 450g strawberries, pureed instead.



Eco tips for October

It's a year since we started our journey with eco-tips: how have you done? Even small steps make a big difference, and some of our future eco-tips will be recycling earlier ones with ideas of how to take it a bit further.

With harvest celebrations still fresh in our minds this month we're looking at food.

This week's eco tip: It's World Vegetarian Day. Meat and milk production is very water-intensive, and by occasionally having meals with meat and dairy alternatives you can help ease the pressure on water globally. If you've already taken this step maybe try making more days meat/dairy-free.

This week's eco tip: Next time you can't finish a restaurant meal, ask to take home your leftovers to enjoy the next day. It might not work with soup, but chefs like to know their creations are appreciated, and you're helping to avoid it going to landfill.

This week's eco tip: It's UN World Food Day. It often focuses on how investment in food security and rural development will change the future of migration. We can play our part in this by choosing to buy items that are labelled organic or Fairtrade/Rainforest Alliance/EcoSocial, or that have an indication of sustainability, for example "palm oil from sustainable sources". These products don't always cost more than alternatives, but when they do you can be assured that somewhere a small-scale farmer and their community are benefitting environmentally as well as economically.

This week's eco tip: When shopping for vegetarian ingredients try to keep food miles low by looking for British pulses and grains. You can find some in supermarkets and smaller stores and some are available online.

This week's eco tip: Be inspired by St Francis (celebrated this month) who

saw that every creature, atom and plant bears the makers mark. "He delighted in all the works of God's hands and from the vision of joy on earth his mind soared aloft to the life-giving source and cause of it all. In everything beautiful he saw Him who is beauty itself and he followed his Beloved everywhere by his likeness imprinted on creation" (Thomas of Celano). Does seeing the world through the eyes of St Francis alter your own relationship with the abundant harvest that it provides us with?




