

Time to get a warm glow using the 'Golden Rule'

October has arrived! I was taken a bit by surprise when we reached the middle of September and suddenly the weather became autumnal. Why? Because, as I always do, I was trying to cling on to the remains of the summer and this year we were so blessed with summer sun and warmth even over the August Bank Holiday weekend when we finally managed to get away to the beach for a week of rest and recuperation, which I now recognise was very much needed.

And now here we are arriving in October, and having no ability to predict the weather when you will be reading this, I'm pretty sure it's very likely to be feeling very autumnal. Autumn, for me, brings some sadness; we've waved goodbye to the swallows and martins (two of my favourite birds) who arrived in April, noisily searching in large groups for suitable places to nest and dutifully nurturing their eggs and parenting their new arrivals, enduringly sharing the feeding of them until they were grown and strong enough to fly the nest and follow their parents to warmer climates. I suppose I'm a little envious of their determination to survive and thrive only in the sun.

But just because it's autumn it doesn't mean the sun disappears. In fact, as I sit and write this in the last throws of September, the sun is shining outside beautifully, the wind is cold, but it's a beautiful day anyway. It just means we need to dress appropriately if we want to get out to enjoy the delights of autumn; the harvest fruit of blackberries and apples, pears and elderberries etc. And even though we will have celebrated Harvest formally in the previous month, October is a time for finishing off of the harvest gatherings before winter begins to emerge.

For me, this time of year is about taking stock of the good things in our lives, which is the goodness of God. Even when we experience difficult times – and let's face it, everyone has been affected in some way or another

by the Covid-19 pandemic - Christians are drawn into reflecting on our creator God, and the responsibilities God has gifted humankind over his lovingly created world. We have been gifted a beautiful world with abundant resources and yet, as human beings, we experience a world that is not equally fair to all people and all living things, and we recognise that even in our own country and our parish, that some people are struggling much more than others. As people of God, we need seek our sustenance in and through God's word which teaches us to live so that God's harvest is reaped – that is that all people will come to know God's goodness for them.

The Bible tells us that Jesus says "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself." May I then challenge everyone to make October a month where we determinedly seek to put the needs of others before ourselves; 'looking out for one another as we would have others do for us.' This is known as the 'Golden Rule' quoted by Jesus in Luke 6:31 and Matthew 7:12.

When we put the needs of others before ourselves, I can guarantee that your giving of yourself will bring the greatest rewards and delights. It is so good to give rather than receive, and in giving whatever we are able, I've no doubt that the least it will bring will be a warm glow to your hearts. Go on, give it a go.

Church Services

All services, for the time being, at Holy Trinity will start at 10am (there will be no 9am service on the second Sunday- it will be 10am).

Services at St Peter's will start at our usual time there at 10.30am.

There is no communion, or refreshments, at present.

To comply with all the Covid-19 secure advice unfortunately we are going to be very restricted on numbers who can attend at both churches.

Because of the restrictions if you wish to attend a service at either church you need to ring or email Heather to ask to be put on a list of attendance for a Sunday. This is vital as we do not want to turn people away.

Those able to attend will be contacted so please do not turn up if you have not been informed that you can attend. A Guidance note has been prepared for all those attending- please read it carefully.

It is compulsory that face coverings are worn in the Church buildings so please come prepared.

Church leaders/preachers/pray-ers are permitted to temporarily lift their face coverings when speaking...but for congregation members it is now mandatory to wear them inside church at all times.

For those not able to attend we will be continuing with services being sent out by email and resources being sent in the post as at present.

The Churches' Premises are still closed to everyone outside service times and entry can only take place with the agreement of Heather or in her absence the Churchwardens – please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

We would ask for your prayers during what is going to be a difficult and developing situation.

Remembrance Services on Sunday November 8th

Sadly, due to very difficult practical issues to remain Covid 19 secure for the nature of these services, it is very unlikely that there will be a physical 'all gathered together 'kind of service inside either church building on this Sunday. However, we are planning special arrangements to commemorate Remembrance Sunday on November 8th and more details will be forthcoming on those.

Memorial Services

Again, for practical reasons it seems very unlikely that we will be able to hold our usual memorial services in either Church. However as with Remembrance we are making special arrangements to ensure that families and individuals will be able to remember their loved ones as part of the church families of Holy Trinity and St Peter's. More details will made available.

Christmas Fayre and Wreath Display (Holy Trinity)

The PCC decided at their meeting last Monday that it was not going to be feasible to hold our usual Christmas Fayre or the display of wreaths in Church this year. This is an important fund-raising event for the Church so we would ask that, if possible. you consider give a one-off gift to the Church to cover what you might have spent at the Fayre.

We may instead be able to do a virtual display of wreaths (collection of photos) perhaps? We will also be creating other resources to celebrate Christmas in a safe / distanced / at home / on line way.

A very familiar sounding charity for some of us this time; as we have our very own branch of MU at church, where in normal times we meet once a month; but as with a lot of things this year, unfortunately we have been closed since lockdown.

Mothers' Union started in 1876 when the founder Mary Sumner, the wife of the Rector in the parish of Old Alresford, Hampshire became passionate about transforming the home lives of parish families by helping the women to support one another in raising their children. Mary's dream was for every home to be filled with the light and love of Jesus. She started meetings of a group of women, young and old, rich and poor together to help better conditions for women and children and later speaking out on difficult issues of the day, including raising the marriage age of girls from 12 to 16.

From these small and early beginnings, the meetings grew as others set up MU groups in their areas and today Mothers' Union is one of the largest Christian charities in the world with over 4 million members in 84 countries, the majority of members being in Asia and Africa with almost 2 million members in India alone. In many African countries MU members wear their blue and white uniforms with pride as they meet and to do their voluntary work.

Prayer has always been at the centre of the work of the Mothers' Union and at midday each day, members pause to pray. The Wave of Prayer is continuous 24/7 all around the globe, as different countries, areas and leaders are prayed for daily.

What MU members do at their meetings varies from group to group, area or country as of course needs are different across the world.

Our own group at Hartshill has a varied programme for the year, some meetings have speakers, which often inspires us as we learn about different charities or learn from MU speakers about some of the things going on in our own diocese; other times may find us knitting teddies or blankets for the poor; making crosses in pockets or finger bears to give out to those who are ill whilst at other meetings we may have a fun night with a quiz or party. We provide toiletries for the local hospital which are given out as emergency packs for those unexpectedly having an overnight stay in hospital.

Other UK groups run courses such as parenting classes or for those with a prison nearby, members may visit prisoners or be found running a creche to look after the children while their parents are visiting someone; other members may be helping to run a coffee shop in a city centre where mothers and toddlers can meet together. 'Away From it All' can provide much needed holidays for the disadvantaged.

Across the world, members help run literacy programmes, help with food distribution, campaign against injustice in gender inequality, run Bible study classes, visit the sick and elderly, run marriage preparation classes, help to teach practical skills such as dressmaking, gardening or how to set up small businesses, help in refugee camps, reconciliation work among tribes just to mention a few of the projects keeping members busy all over the world.

As you can see from the above, our meetings are not just about sitting around drinking tea and eating cake, although we do enjoy doing that too! Not all members are mothers and not all members are women either! Locally, when the different groups meet together for a deanery or diocesan service in a church there will be a few men among the congregation.

Sharon's Recipe - Moist Chocolate Cake with Coffee Filling and Chocolate Fudge Topping

Ingredients Cake

150g / 5oz self-raising flour - sieved 75g / 3oz drinking chocolate 175g / 6oz castor sugar 175g / 6oz butter or baking margarine at room temperature 3 large eggs 3 tbsp of boiling water **Ingredients Filling**

75g / 3oz butter at room temperature 150g / 6oz icing sugar Up to 2 tbsp fresh or instant black coffee at room temperature

Ingredients Topping

110g / 4oz granulated sugar

115ml / 4 fl oz milk 150g / 5oz plain chocolate broken into small chunks 50g / 2oz butter cut into chunks

2 tbsp fresh double cream (optional)

To Decorate (Optional) 50g / 2oz white chocolate, broken into chunks

Method

- Preheat oven to gas mark 4/180 degrees C/ 350 degrees F. Grease and line 2 x23 cm / 8 inch round sandwich cake tins
- 2. Sift the flour and drinking chocolate into a large mixing bowl
- 3. Add all other ingredients and blend together. Beat with an electric whisk for a couple of minutes or longer with a wooden spoon until smooth
- 4. Put equal amounts into the tins and bake for 25 minutes (or until risen, springs back when pressed very gently in the middle. If not quite done, leave in the oven for 2-5 minutes longer and test again.
- **5.** Remove from the oven and leave in the tins for a 3-4 minutes then remove from the tins and cool completely on a wire rack.

Method Filling

Whisk the butter until soft, add the icing sugar and stir a little to combine and keep the icing sugar from going everywhere then add 1 tablespoon of coffee and mix adding more coffee as required to get a nice consistency like very thick cream, whisk or beat with a wooden spoon until light and fluffy. When cakes are cold, sandwich together with the coffee filling.

Method Topping

Put granulated sugar and milk into a small pan, heat stirring occasionally and then simmer gently for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from the heat. Immediately add the plain chocolate and butter and cream if using. Blend well together then leave to cool before spreading over the top of the cake.

To Decorate (optional)


Melt the white chocolate in a heat-proof bowl over a small saucepan of water stirring to make sure it heats evenly, be gentle with the heat and as soon as it is pourable, using a spoon swirl it in a single line to form a spiral from the centre of the cake to the edge. The chocolate should be barely warm (not hot or very warm as this will melt the fudge topping). One you have a spiral line take a knife and with the back of it run it from the middle of the cake to the end in 5 equally spaced places around the cake then run the knife the other way from the outside of the cake to the middle in between each previous knife line to form a feather pattern on top.

This cake keeps well in a tin for up to a week or can be frozen.
















No Internet?






