We live in a world where almost everything is instant now - we can place an order for something on a Saturday night and get it delivered to our home on a Sunday afternoon, we can order ready cooked meals, our groceries, birthday presents, plants, pet food, and even a new car, instantly, online. So in this world of immediacy, how do we learn to be patient, and wait, when we ask God for something in prayer? Most dictionary definitions of waiting refer to expecting something to happen, but that doesn't mean we should be just doing nothing while we wait! So what should we be doing...after all, it may be days, weeks, years before that answer comes! I came across an article which gave some very good advice on how to fill that time.

One - trust God, even if you have to wait a long time. **Micah 7:7** "But as for me, I watch in hope for the Lord, I wait for God my Saviour, my God will hear me."

<u>Two</u> - pursue your faith, continue to worship God whatever is happening. **1 Chronicles 16:11** "Look to the Lord and His strength; seek His face always."

<u>Three</u> - Serve others while you are waiting - God may give us simple tasks to prepare us for something bigger, there is always a purpose. **Luke 16:10** "Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with very much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with very much."

<u>Four</u> - Be watchful and expectant for God to answer the way He chooses, even if it is "No", as there will be a very good reason for that! **Psalm 5:3** "In the morning, O Lord, you hear my voice; in the morning I lay my requests before you and wait in expectation"

<u>Five</u> - Be grateful while waiting, focus on blessings you already have rather than the problem you are looking for answers to. **1 Thessalonians 5:16-18** "Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

So, it's worth remembering that whatever we are waiting for, it <u>is</u> worth the wait, and we will continue to grow spiritually during this time. **Isaiah 40:31** "but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint"……now doesn't that sound worth waiting for!!

Church Services

To comply with all the Covid-19 secure advice unfortunately we are going to be very restricted on numbers who can attend at both churches. Because of the restrictions if you wish to attend a service at either church you need to ring or email Heather to ask to be put on a list of attendance for a Sunday. This is vital as we do not want to turn people away. Those able to attend will be contacted so please do not turn up if you have not been informed that you can attend. A Guidance note has been prepared for all those attending- please read it carefully. It is compulsory that face coverings are worn in the Church buildings so please come prepared. INTERNATIONAL CHRISTIAN MARITIME ASSOCIATION (ICMA)

ICMA is a free association of Christian organizations working for the welfare of seafarers around the world. It was founded in 1969 to encourage collaboration of mutual assistance to seafarers' charities. Their trustees are made up of representatives from the various seafaring charities, including our own Mission to Seafarers. Member organizations represent various Christian churches and communities, with each member organization retaining its independence and autonomy.

ICMA work at local levels in ports and at national and international levels and they define seafarers as people who work in merchant shipping, fishing industry and on passenger ships. It is their mission to promote unity, peace and tolerance and it is the duty of every IMCA chaplain and welfare worker to serve seafarers and their dependants regardless of nationality, religion, culture, gender or ethnic origin. They currently represent more than 400 seafarers' centres and 900 chaplains and ship visitors in approximately 125 countries.

Their objectives are the promotion of the spiritual, social and material welfare of all seafarers and the relief of need, hardship and distress among them. Some work from seafarers centres visiting the ships in port; others sail with seafarers on their ships.

Many seafarers are on 9 month contracts; so are away from home for most of the year and depending on the owners of their ships, some crew work very long hours, some in dangerous conditions and some with the most basic of food and portions. Over 90% of what's in our homes or garages come by ship; so we have a lot to be thankful for to these hardworking people.

In normal times, ships' crews can lead lonely, stressful lives with little contact with their families but during this COVID 19 pandemic, many seafarers have been isolated more than ever, as they have been unable to

take shore leave or end their contracts and return home due to national lockdowns and travel restrictions. Ships, especially cruise ships are anchored off shore, with no sign of movement in sight as yet.

Some disreputable ship owners withdraw wages for months or abandon their ships and leave the crew to fend for themselves with little or no food. ICMA help to fight their case through court action to reclaim wages owed and repatriate the crew back to their home countries.

ICMA also provide pastoral support and run a 24 hr. 7 days a week chatline to help seafarers in distress or needing someone to listen/talk to, especially if conditions on board are terrible.

Sharon's Recipe - Chocolate Choux Treats (Makes 16-18)



Ingredients - Choux

2½ oz / 60g strong break flour 2 oz / 50g butter cut into small pieces 1 tsp sugar 2 eggs, well beaten 5 fl oz / 150 ml cold water

Ingredients – Filling

9 fl oz / 250 ml full fat milk 1 tbsp cocoa powder 3 egg yolks 2½ oz / 60g castor sugar 1½ tbsp cornflour

Ingredients – Topping

Method - Choux Pastry

Take a square of greaseproof paper large enough to fit all the flour on and fold it in half to form a crease down the middle, open it out and then sieve the flour onto it. Or sieve the flour into a dry jug. Stir the tsp of sugar into the flour. You need to be able to shoot the flour and sugar into the mixture all at once later.

Put the water in a medium sized saucepan together with the pieces of butter, and over a moderate heat melt the butter into the water, stirring a little.

When all the butter is melted, and the water is about to boil, turn off the heat and shoot the flour into the water using one hand, whilst you stir with a wooden spoon with the other hand and beat until you have a

4 oz /100g dark choc (about 45% cocoa), broken into cubes 4 fl oz / 100 ml double cream

You will also need grease proof paper and 2 baking trays

smooth ball that leaves the sides of the saucepan clean. (takes about 1 min) Beat in the eggs a little at a time until you have a smooth glossy paste Heat the oven to 200 Degrees C / 180 degrees C Fan / Gas mark 6. Cut greaseproof paper to the size of the baking trays and grease lightly, then run under cold water, tap and shake of excess water. Place each moistened sheet on a baking tray. This helps to create steam that helps the pastry to rise. Take a teaspoon at a time and put blobs of

choux evenly over the baking sheets

Once the oven has reached temperature bake for 10 minutes and then increase the heat to 220 degrees C / 200 degrees C fan / Gas Mark 7 and bake for a further 15-20 minutes until the choux is crisp light and a rich golden colour. Pierce the side of each one with a skewer to let steam out, then cool on a wire rack.

Method - Chocolate crème pâtissière filling

Put the egg yolks, caster sugar and cornflour into a bowl that will hold about a pint of liquid and beat together

Put milk in a small saucepan with pouring spouts if possible and warm up.

Put cocoa in a very dry jug and once the milk is warm pour it over the cocoa and whisk it together, return it to the pan and whisk or stir it gently with a wooden spoon but keep watch and once little bubbles start to form round the edge pour it over the eggs, sugar and cornflour and whisk together.

Put the mixture back into the saucepan and constantly whisk and gently bring it to the boil and it will thicken.

Let it simmer gently for 1 minute whisking all the time and then take it off the heat.

Continue to whisk it every few minutes until it is completely cold. By whisking you will prevent a skin forming.

Once the crème pâtissière is cold you can either put it into a piping bag with a long filling nozzle or you can slice the choux buns and put / pipe approx. 1 oz / 30g of filling into each bun.

Method - Chocolate Ganache Topping

Place the cream in a small saucepan and heat at a moderate temperature. As it is heating put the cubes of dark chocolate into the cream and stir whilst it melts in. Once it is almost boiling with little bubbles forming, turn off the heat and mix the chocolate and the cream well together. Stir occasionally until cold. Put it in the refrigerator for about 30 minutes to firm up and then spoon a heaped teaspoon onto each bun.

The best way to serve is to freeze the buns partially if you want to eat the same day or fully for another time. To freeze, place them on plastic plates or trays without touching each other and let them open freeze for about 4 hours then transfer them to freezer boxes or bags.

When needed defrost for about 1 hour at room temperature.

If partially frozen just leave in the freezer until about 20 minutes before you need them and defrost at room temperature. By freezing straight away you prevent the pastry becoming soggy. They are rather rich and you won't be able to eat many at a time so good to save for another day. These are also a nice size to serve with other cakes for an afternoon tea. Serve with a pastry fork or spoon as they are too squidgy to eat with fingers. Hope you enjoy!

- 25. Christians have only one spouse. This is called monotony.




