A good read...

Do you have a favourite author, or book or even library? Well I have been doing some research recently about a very famous kind of "Library" – that is both very well known and used despite having less than 100 books in it!

What Library am I talking about... well...the Bible. Bible means 'books' as it is in fact a collection of books, letters, songs and historical accounts bound together into a single book – written by over 40 authors and taking around 1500 years in total to write.

It is still the most interpreted and printed book in history and can be found translated into over 1,200 languages. It also has critics as well as friends in almost every country in the world. People have died for this book, banned this book and in the United States of America alone 168,000 Bibles are either sold or given away every day (according to the Gideons, Wycliffe International and the International Bible Societies.)

All these facts may be interesting....but in and of themselves won't do us much good unless we actually read the text for ourselves. One person once quipped that the Bible is in fact the <u>Best Instructions Before Leaving Earth</u> ... and, as instruction manuals go, the Bible is surprisingly and refeshingly honest and practical!

If you've never read it – try a Gospel (Matthew, Mark, Luke or John) first to help you. There are also simple Bible notes out there to help you understand it more. Give it a go and you might just be surprised by what you find.



So if you want to come along to a meeting to see what it's like, you will always be very welcome!



Chilli Bean Soup with Cheesy Garlic Bread

Serves 6. 10 minutes to prepare and 30 minutes to cook., 256 calories per serving.

Ingredients for the soup	Method	
1 tbsp oil 1 large onion, chopped 1 garlic clove, crushed 1 tbsp tomato purée 1tsp mild chilli powder ½tsp ground cumin 1 x 400g tin chopped tomatoes 400ml (14fl oz) vegetable stock 1 x 400g tin kidney beans, drained and rinsed 1 x 400g tin butter beans, drained and rinsed 1 red pepper, diced handful coriander, chopped	Heat the oil in a large pan over a mediumhigh heat and cook the onion for 5 minutes until softened. Stir in the garlic, tomato purée and spices and cook for 1 minute, then add the chopped tomatoes and stock. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from the heat, allow to cool slightly, then whizz in a blender and return to the pan. Add the beans and red pepper, bring back to the boil and cook for 10 minutes. Season to taste and add extra stock or water if you prefer a thinner consistency.	
Ingredients for the cheesy garlic bread	Method Meanwhile, grill one side of the baguette	
6 baguette slices 50g (2oz) butter, softened 2 garlic cloves, crushed 100g (3½oz) grated Cheddar cheese	slices. In a bowl, combine the butter, garlic and cheese and spoon onto the untoasted sides of the bread. Grill for a few minutes until golden and bubbling. Divide the soup between 6 bowls or cups and scatter over the coriander. Serve with the cheesy garlic bread.






