#### Freely you have received....freely give.

Why is the dead sea dead? It's because although water enters through tributaries there are no major outlets for the water to go to. Only receiving and never giving out is also unhealthy – which is why giving is a good thing – not just for the person or thing we are giving to – but we are also blessed by giving to others.

Yes – at church people give in order to pay the bills, maintain the building, pay our share to the Diocese and fulfil our obligations etc. but giving out is also part of the mission (and the duty) of the church. Here at Holy Trinty, we give specifically to local and international charities and organisations like Youth-180 and Aim for change. But we support other charities too like The Children's Society (at Christingle) and the Zulum Trust – (through the charitable purchase of our palm crosses.) But we can so easily overlook the ways in which as a church and as individuals we give in many, many other ways…for example…..

Resources and gifts for our community events (Sausage sizzle and Christmas meal), transport, items for the foodbank, baking cakes for events, gifts for the Summer and Christmas Fayre, items to help with Messy Church, milk and biscuits for refreshments, harvest produce, money for flowers and time to arrange them, setting up for services, postage and phonecalls, as well as the incalculable time given so generously by so many people eg, administration, service planning, rotas, staffing the community library, fabric, pastoral visits, mowing the lawns and keeping the grounds tidy etc... etc...

We can only give freely to God because He has given freely to us and remember the Bible teaches us that the measure we give out is the measure we receive. And although we can never out-give God (because He gave everything for us) freely you have received....so freely give.....because don't forget it is actually more blessed to give than to receive.

So give and be a blessing and be blessed in the process!



26	Raise your hands and thank God for all the good things He gives us as we celebrate the Harvest Supper tonight.
27	Harvest service – kneel before God and ask Him what we can give Him out of what He has given us.
28	Stand and pray for the deanery standing committee which meets today.
29	Sit and pray for university students that they would take time to think about the big decisions they are making.
30	Look back at the letter you wrote at the start of the month. Raise your hands and thank God for the month you had. Pray for the things not yet answered.



Place a third of the raspberries on the bottom sponge layer, spoon half the cream mixture on top and spread over evenly. Then place a third of the raspberries onto of the cream and then top with the other sponge layer. Spoon the remaining cream over the top and finish with the remaining raspberries. Grate some chocolate over the top to finish if desired.


